

U.S., Soviets Fail To Name U.N. Head

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—The United States and the Soviet Union failed to reach agreement yesterday on naming a stop-gap U.N. secretary-general despite more than two hours of intense private negotiations.

"We made no progress," a U.S. spokesman said. "We are disappointed."

Teamster Boss Firmly Rejected By AFL-CIO

NEW YORK (AP)—AFL-CIO chiefs voted overwhelmingly yesterday against taking back the Teamsters Union so long as James R. Hoffa heads it.

George Meany, AFL-CIO president, said the decision represented a firm belief by the union leaders that Hoffa was "unfit to head a trade union."

Meany added that the Teamsters, with 1.5-million members, the nation's largest labor group, were dominated by corrupt and criminal elements now more than at the time of their expulsion four years ago, after a series of Senate disclosures.

Meany also said applications have been received from about 100 Teamsters local trying to leave Hoffa's organization and join the AFL-CIO. He said 40 such applications had been received since August when a number of local defections were reported.

Meany added there has been no effort to calculate the number of members represented in the applications. The Teamsters Union has between 800 and 900 locals.

The council vote was announced officially as 25-2 to reject a move to take back the Teamsters. But a third vote reported later in favor of the Teamsters would make the count 24-3.

U.N. Hears Charge Of U.S. Attack Plan

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — Cuba told the United Nations yesterday that the United States is organizing a new attack against Fidel Castro's government and using pressure on other Latin America governments to break with his regime.

These charges topped off a major policy speech to the

The private talks began in the U. S. mission to the United Nations at 4 p.m. between U. S. Chief Delegate Adlai E. Stevenson and Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian A. Zorin.

Stevenson left the talks at 4:45 p.m. to attend the U. N. General Assembly, where earlier Nigerian Foreign Minister Jaja Wachuku blasted the big powers for failure to reach agreement on the issue.

U. S. Ambassador Charles W. Yost stayed on for the rest of the negotiating session. He is the U. S. deputy permanent representative on the Security Council.

No date was set for new negotiations and the U. S. view was understood to be that the latest developments were a backward step.

Wachuku's speech reflected growing impatience among some of the smaller nations who have been pressing both East and West to find a formula for naming an interim successor to Dag Hammarskjold.

Both East and West have no objections on the man for the post-Burma's Ambassador U Thant. The difficulty centered on how he should conduct the U. N. executive machinery.

Third U.S. Test

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Atomic Energy Commission announced that a nuclear test of low yield was conducted underground yesterday at the commission's Nevada test site.

General Assembly by Cuban Foreign Minister Raul Roa, who repeated some of the charges made Monday night by the Cuban government in Havana.

Roa said he would go into detail later when the assembly discusses Cuba's charges of aggression. This item directed against the United States is inscribed on the U.N. agenda.

The Cuban foreign minister told the 100-nation assembly that Cuba is the scene of "the building of a Socialist society 90 miles from a stubborn empire determined to repress the inexorable flow of history."

Without significant variation, Roa followed the line on most international questions that the Soviet-bloc nations have been adopting in the assembly's policy debate.

He urged the immediate seating of Communist China, backed Soviet terms for settling the Berlin crisis, came out for reforming the U.N. structure such as Algeria, Angola, West New Guinea and others with about the same emphasis as most Communist speakers.

The U.S. State Department in Washington has already called this "ridiculous."

Commercial Blue Laws

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pennsylvania's blue laws against commercial activities on Sunday will remain in effect, the Supreme Court decided yesterday. It refused to reconsider its May 29 decision upholding the blue laws.

U.S. Gives Recognition To New Syrian Regime

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States extended formal recognition to the new Syrian republic yesterday, 12 days after that Middle East state dramatically split from President Gamal Abdel Nasser's United Arab Republic.
