However, only discussion may be started by the student members, Miss Ganter said. They are not allowed to vote on matters brought up in the Senate.

"We feel we have the responsibility to the students to go to the meeting and explain what they want done," Miss Ganter said.

The two students have not gone to Walker to request a calendar change because of previous statements he has made to Dennis Foianini, SGA president, and Gomer Williams, chairman of the Town Independent Men's student welfare committee, Miss Ganter said.

"We didn't feel that Dr. Walker would give us any different reasons than he has already stated or that, because of these reasons, he would change the policy," Miss Ganter said.

Walker told Williams in a letter yesterday that "the faculty has planned for presentation of courses over the period provided. To cut out days now would reduce the term and make it necessary to pile up work at the end."

Williams would be allowed to attend the Senate meeting, Miss Ganter said, but she and Klein would have on speak on his behalf.

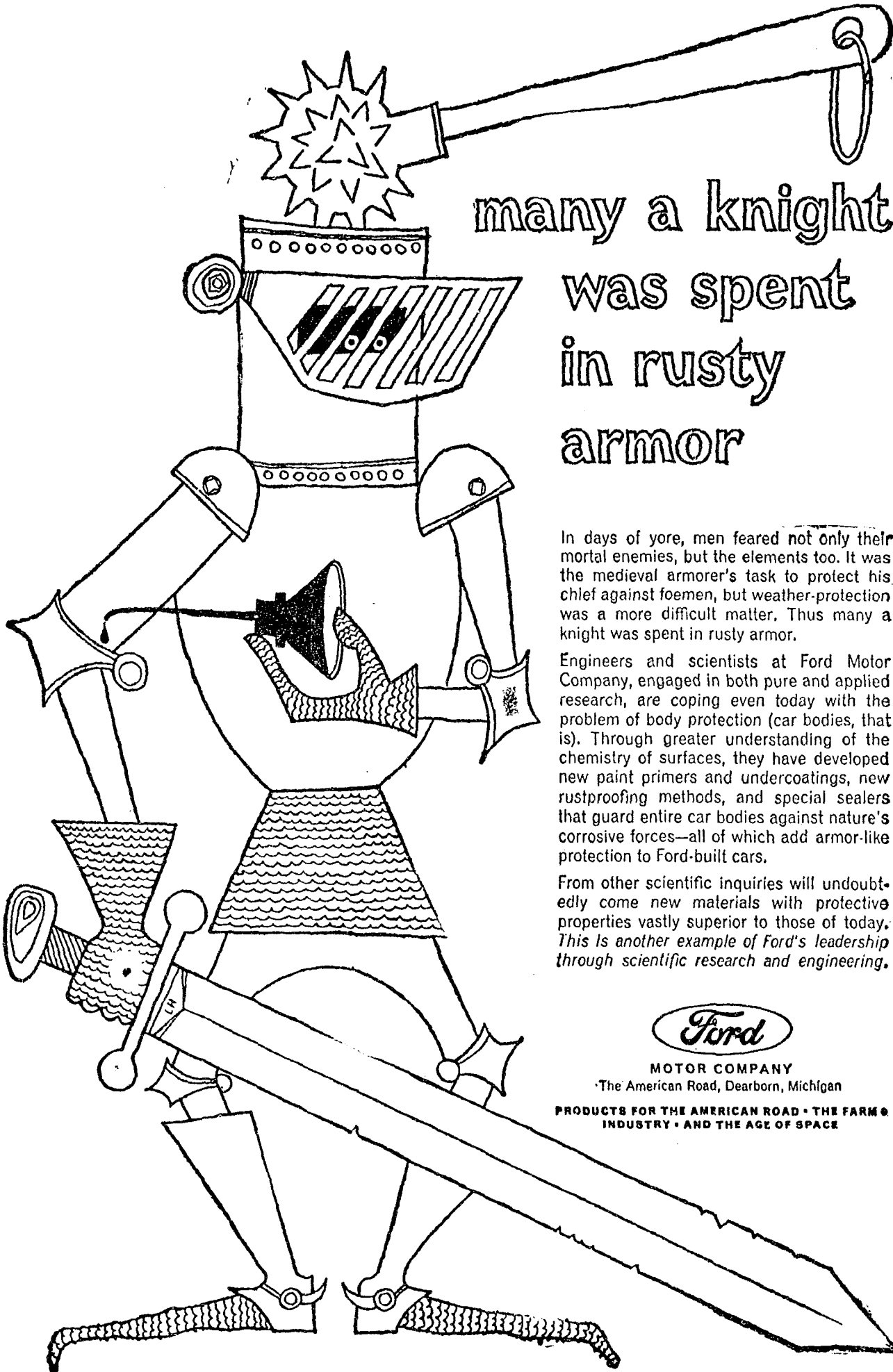
