

Prof to Present Vocal Recital

Prof from Syracuse to Speak At Chapel for Greek Sunday

Raymond Brown, associate professor of music, will present a vocal recital at 4 p.m. tomorrow in Schwab. He will be accompanied by Barry S. Brinsmaid, assistant professor of music.

The program will open with a poem by Ben Jonson set to music. Poetry by John Milton, Tennessee Williams, A. E. Houseman, John Macfield and Edmund Spenser will follow. Also featured will be "The Rose Tree" by Charles Ives, "Paul Bunyan" by John Duke and "John Bly" by John Bly.

Brown will sing Beethoven's "Opus 109," "The Pastoral" by Tchaikovsky and songs by Henry Purcell and George Murray. "I'll Follow My Soldier" by George Gershwin and "The Rose Tree" by Charles Ives will be followed by a fine voice student solo.

Dr. Leland Jamison, professor of religion and chairman of the Department of Religion at Syracuse University will be the speaker at the 10:55 a.m. service tomorrow in Schwab. His topic will be "In and Out of the World."

Janice Wenner, president of the Pan-Hellenic Council, and Richard Pirozzi, president of the Intra-Fraternity Council, will participate in the service. Thirty-three sororities and fraternities are sponsoring the service as a part of Greek Week.

Dr. Jamison is author of "Light for the Gentiles" and co-editor of a four-volume series called "The American Life." He was a U.S. Army Chaplain during World War I and has taught at Princeton University and Macalester College.

The gift was presented in commemoration of the Tagore Centennial, the 100th anniversary of the poet's birth.

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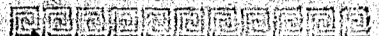
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
