Defending IM Champions Roll to Second Victory

Delta Sigma Phi, defending IM champions in the fraternity division, scored its second straight win of the season by downing winless Phi Epsilon Pi, 13-0, on the golf course fields last night. The winners now have a 2-0 record.

Dick Cunningham was the spark plug for Delta Sig as he threw two touchdown passes—one for four yards to Wendy Wear, and the other, a 37-yard aerial to Ray Brennan. The crafty quarterback also booted an extra point.

Phi Sigma Kappa stayed in the IM race by notching its third straight win, a 4-3 first down victory over Alpha Zeta. Neither team was able to mount a touchdown drive.

In other fraternity action, Theta Delta Chi stretched its record to 3-0 by downing Alpha Gamma Rho, 13-0. Quarterback Jim Baker passed for one TD to Larry Lagerio, and another to Gene Bella, who also booted an extra point.

John Black kicked a 30-yard field goal in the final seconds to give Acacia a 3-2 win over Sigma Nu.

Kappa Sigma extended its record to 3-0 by edging Sigma Chi, 5-2 on first downs.

Tau Kappa Epsilon easily downed Phi Kappa Psi, 16-0. Junior Vic Brandenburg returned

an intercepted pass 43 yards and Barry Glein threw to Gary Moore for the winner's TD's. Mike Soccio figured in the other TKE score as he booted a 23-yard field goal. He also kicked an extra point.

In Independent action, John Dobryznski led Jordan to a 19-0 victory over Hemlock by throwing TD passes to Lynn Benniger, Dave Lehmer, and Jim Reese. Dobryznski, a freshman who starred at quarterback for South River High, N.J., threw scoring tosses of 7, 14, and 18 yards respectively. The TD passes were his 5th, 6th and 7th of the season.

Other Independent action showed Poplar topping Locust, 6-2, on first downs, to remain unbeaten in four games. Watts I defeated Larch, 7-6, as Wes Olsen found George Yacilla alone in the end zone for a TD and kicked the extra point.

In IM action opposite Beaver Stadium, Nittany 25 topped Nittany 41, 26-7; Nittany 39 beat Nittany 26, 6-0; Nittany 36 stopped Nittany 21, 18-6; Nittany 33 nipped Nittany 35, 7-0, and Nittany 38 edged Nittany 42, 4-3 on first downs.

ROTC notched a 6-0 win over Nittany 27; Nittany 29 won over Nittany 43, 3-0, and Nittany 23 defeated Forest Society, 14-0.

Spahn, Donovan Lead Leagues In Season ERA

NEW YORK (AP) — Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves captured his third National League earned run championship and Dick Donovan of Washington paced the American League in 1961, the final averages disclosed yesterday.

Spahn, a 21-game winner, yielded 88 earned runs in 263 innings for a 3.01 mark. It was the highest mark ever for a National League leader. The veteran southpaw fashioned four shutouts, including the only big league no-hitter. He also won the title in 1947 and 1953.

Donovan, recently traded to Cleveland, was the first Washington pitcher since Garland Barston in 1928 to win the American League crown. The big right-hander gave up 45 earned runs in 169 innings for a 2.40 mark.

Linksmen Finish Fourth In ECAC Golf Tourney

Penn State finished fourth Saturday in the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference four man golf tournament at Bethpage Park, Long Island.

Syracuse won the team title, edging defending champion Navy by one stroke, 317-318. Massachusetts Institute of Technology finished third with 319, the Lions were next with a score of 324.

State's Jim Tabor finished third in the individual scoring with a 76, three strokes behind John Schmidt of Syracuse, who copped the individual title.
