

IFC-Panhel To Name Top Pledges

Five sorority pledges and five fraternity pledges have been named as finalists in the Outstanding Pledge contest. The winners, one from each category will be announced at a banquet at 6:30 tonight in Hetzel Union dining rooms A and B.

The banquet will be the third event of Greek Week.

Nominated as outstanding sorority pledges are Florence Workman, Kappa Delta; Maria Stevens, Delta Delta Delta; Elinor Space, Alpha Omicron Pi; Sandra Tait, Chi Omega; and Lynn Crawford, Alpha Chi Omega.

The winner of this category will be chosen by a committee composed of Mrs. Richard C. Vanderpool, assistant dean of women; Mrs. R. C. Blaney, senior adviser to the Panhellenic council; Susan Common, first vice president of Panhel; Pamela Chadwick, second vice president; and Helen Gutman, parliamentarian.

Nominees for the outstanding fraternity pledge are Richard Tuft, Delta Upsilon; Guy Jackson, Acacia; Mark Schwarz, Beta Sigma Rho; Derald Cummings, Triangle; and Fred Good, Tau Kappa Epsilon.

A trophy for the pledge class with the academic highest average for last spring semester will also be awarded at the banquet.

Three motion pictures, "3-2-1-0," "Neighbors," and "Eight Steps to Peace," will be shown continuously from 9:45 a.m. until 3:30 p.m., today in the Hetzel Union assembly Room to commemorate United Nations Week, the 16th anniversary of the founding of the U.N.

An International Relations Club booth on the main floor of the HUB will distribute UNICEF Christmas greeting cards, UNICEF stamps, information about international activities and other materials.

Proceeds from the sale of the cards will go to needy children, while the proceeds from the stamps will be used to support projects in underdeveloped countries.

Highlighting the program on Friday will be a speech at 7:30 p.m. in the Eisenhower Memorial Chapel Lounge in "The Future of the U.N." by Amiya Chakravarty.

Also on Friday, town children and students will solicit donations

in the community and the residence halls to be distributed by the U.N. to needy children throughout the world.

All interested persons are invited to attend these activities which are sponsored by the local chapter of the American Association for the United Nations and the United World Federalists, the International Relations Club, the Cosmopolitan Club, the student council of the College of Education, the College of Home Economics and the Department of Elementary Education.

Series to Sponsor Ballet Performance

The American Ballet Theatre, which has just completed its 37th New York season in the past 23 years, will present one of the first performances of their tour this year at 8 p.m. Sunday in Recreation Hall.

The University Artists Series is sponsoring the performance. Distribution of student tickets will begin at 1:30 p.m. tomorrow at the Hetzel Union desk.

The ballet's fall tour includes 36 performances from Vermont to Oklahoma. In Pennsylvania the company will appear in Wilkes-Barre and Pittsburgh, in addition to the University.

Chilean-born prima ballerina Lupe Serrano, and dancers John Kriza and Royes Fernandez head the cast. Other outstanding members of the company who will appear here include Toni Lander, Ruth Ann Koesun, Ivan Allen, Sallie Wilson and Bruce Marks.

Featured guest soloists on the tour are Mariane Orlando and Caj Selling, both of the Royal Swedish Ballet.

Lucia Chase and Oliver Smith are the co-directors of the ballet

theatre. Miss Chase has performed ballerina roles in the classical versions of "Sleeping Beauty," "Giselle" and "La Fille Mal Gardée." She joined the ballet in 1940 when it was first organized, but did not become a director until 1945.

Smith, who became a co-director at the same time as Miss Chase, is a former theatrical designer. His work includes "Fall River Legend," "Oklahoma," "Auntie Mame," "My Fair Lady" and "La Traviata."

The touring company is but one activity of its parent body, the Ballet Theatre Foundation, Inc. The foundation also sponsors a ballet school in Cleveland, Ohio, Indianapolis, Ind., and Oklahoma City, Okla.

In 1954, the foundation started a Ballet Theatre Workshop which premieres works by young choreographers and composers in off-Broadway theatres.

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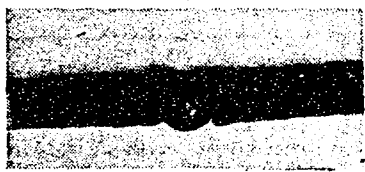
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
