

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy gave the goahead yesterday for a longplanned underground nuclear mittee approved an eight-nation resolution recommending that the explosion in the salt beds of U.N. General Assembly confront New Mexico to launch a new

The pioneer explosion, about 25 miles southeast of Carlsbad, probably will take place during the second week of December, the Atomic Energy Commission said. It will be in a salt shaft, some 1,200 feet below the surface, that cost about \$1 million to dig over the past year.

The power of the explosion, the AEC said, will be five kilotons—equal to the power of 5,000 tons of TNT and about one-fourth that of the atomic bombs dropped on Japan in World War II. Originally, the AEC had planned a 10-kiloton shot.
