

State Matched Against California Passing Ace

Penn State will face one of the top passers in the nation tomorrow when Randy Gold, California's junior signal-caller, leads the Golden Bears against the Lions at Beaver Stadium.

Gold, a second team All-Big Five choice last year, ranks fifth among California's all-time passers in number of completions and he could move up to the No. 3 spot by the end of the year.

He completed 65 passes last

year for 696 yards and a completion percentage of .556.

An injury has kept Gold from seeing action in two of Cal's games this year, but he has still managed to complete 13 of 32 passes for 151 yards and one touchdown.

Larry Balliett, Gold's understudy, has filled in capably when Gold has been sidelined. He directed the Golden Bears to a 21-14 upset victory over Washington.

Balliett has hit on 13 of 24 passes so far for 159 yards and one touchdown.

Bob Wills, who plays the split end in California's Wing T offense, is the leading pass receiver with 8 catches for 104 yards and one TD.

Shortside end Dave Muga is second with 5 receptions for 60 yards.

Andy Nelson, a junior college transfer, is Cal's leading ground gainer with 206 yards in 39 carries for a 5.28 average. Rudy Carvajal, a shifty sophomore, is second with 142 yards in 30 carries for a 4.73 average.

In addition, Coach Marv Levy has a fine fullback in George Pierovich. Lion end coach J. T. White, who scouted the Golden Bears, calls Pierovich "as fine a fullback as I've seen."

Up-to-date statistics on Penn State show that Roger Kochman has taken over the rushing lead from Dave Hayes after picking up 107 yards along the ground against Syracuse last week.

Kochman has 255 yards in 44 attempts for a 5.8 average. Hayes is second with 207 yards in 50 carries for a 4.1 average. Junior Powell, who moved up to the first unit after Don Jonas' injury, is the top pass receiver with 8 catches for 139 yards.

Kochman is second with 6 receptions for 86 yards and Jonas is third with five catches for 75 yards.

Students Show Negative Spirit

MANILA (AP) — Joe Brown, who served in the U.S. Navy in the last war and took part in seven Pacific invasions, says he will fight any challenger anywhere in the world so long as the money is right.

The world lightweight champion from Houston, Tex., made the statement yesterday as he wound up training for his title defense against Bert Somodio of the Philippines tomorrow night.

Brown, 35, will meet sixth-rated Somodio, 27, in a 15-round title fight at the Araneta Coliseum in nearby Quezon City.

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Gridiron Notes

Former Philadelphia Eagle great Pete Pihos, now a scout for the Dallas Texans of the American Football League, was on campus this week to talk to Bill Saul, Chuck Sieminski, Jim Smith, Bob Mitinger and Roger Kochman. Pihos and a bevy of other pro scouts were on hand to watch the Lions wallop Boston University 32-0 earlier this year . . . The Lions' homecoming battle with California tomorrow will mark the first meeting between the two schools . . . The game will also be State's first regular-season meeting with a West Coast school since 1948 when coach Bob Higgins' last team beat Washington State, 7-0. The Lions played and defeated a West Coast team — Oregon — last year in the Liberty Bowl . . . Two members of Rip Egle's squad, Dick Wilson and Don Jonas, have already been drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles. Wilson was drafted in 1959 and Jonas last year . . . Dave Robinson, out with a shoulder separation since the Navy game, has been working out in pads all week and may be ready for limited action against Maryland next week . . . Team Physician Alfred H. Griess said yesterday that Gary Wydman will probably miss tomorrow's game. Wydman, who was slated to back up Junior Powell at right halfback, suffered a bruised chest against Syracuse.

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
