

48th Hort Show Starts Today

"A Century Ago" is the theme of the 48th annual horticulture show which will be held today and tomorrow from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. in the livestock judging pavilion.

The show which has been dedicated to Lyman E. Jackson, dean of the College of Agriculture, calls attention to the centennial of the Civil War. All the displays will be done in the style of the 1860's.

In accordance with the theme, the pavilion has been divided into two sections, the North and the South. The two areas have

been separated by an artificial goldbrick wall.

The Northern side has a gristmill, a Union flag made from flowers and a general store display of fruits and vegetables, as well as several other exhibits.

A white mansion with formal plantings of ornamental evergreens and flowers is the highlight of the Southern section of the show.

Although admission is free, students will be selling apples and cider to visitors. The proceeds will be used for a textbook scholarship for a student in the College of Agriculture and for an exhibit in the Phila-

delphia Flower Show in the spring.

Planned and directed by students, the show gives practical experience to undergraduates in many fields of study.

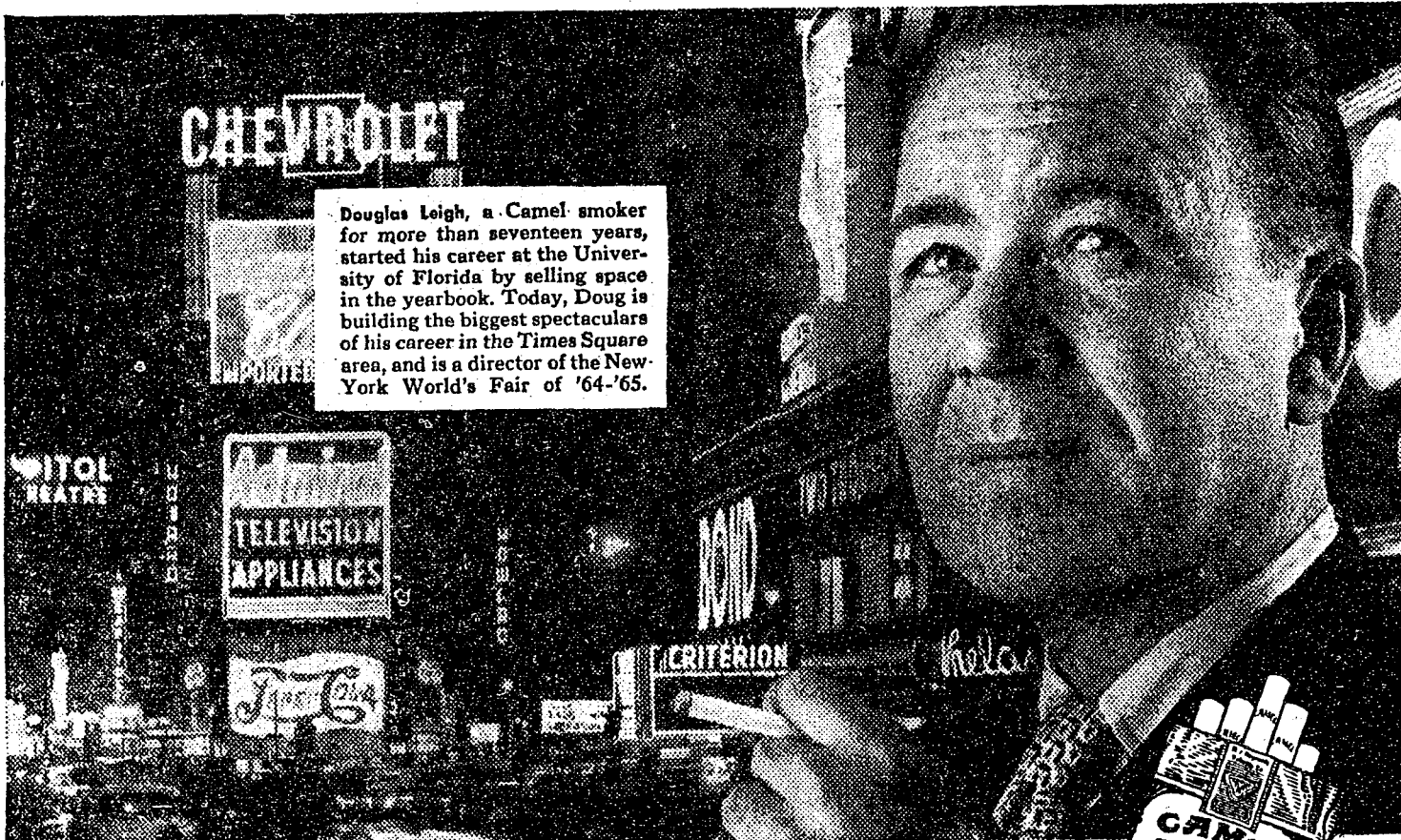
