

LA Junior Suspended; 5 Men Put on Probation

A junior in liberal arts was suspended from the University and five agriculture students were given probationary penalties by the Senate Sub-Committee on Discipline in disciplinary cases this week.

The junior was suspended after he was caught drinking at the football game last Saturday. It was his second offense this year, Daniel R. Leasure, assistant dean of men said Thursday.

The student had been placed on suspended suspension on Oct. 3 for drunken and disorderly conduct after the Navy-Penn State football game, Leasure said.

The liberal arts junior was suspended until the end of the winter term 1961. His suspension penalty will resume when he returns to campus. It will last to the end of the spring term, 1962.

Two frosh taking a two-year agriculture course were put on probation with the office of the dean of men for drinking. Both of the students were minors, Leasure said.

They appeared before the discipline sub-committee. A charge against the students of stealing bicycles was dismissed by the sub-committee after it found that there was not conclusive evidence to support it, Leasure said.

Three other students taking a turf grass winter short course in agriculture were placed on disciplinary probation until the end of the fall term 1962 because they "borrowed bicycles" from the North Halls area, Leasure said.

The students were caught when a Campus Patrolman noticed that there were no lights on the bicycles as they rode past the Hetzel Union building on the night of Oct. 21. Upon stopping the students, Leasure said, the patrolman found the men were riding girls bicycles.

The patrolman then asked them if they had permission to use the bicycles, Leasure said. When the students said no, the patrolman reported them to the patrol office. They were turned over to the dean of men's office.

Mayor Dilworth Will Deliver Chapel Address

The Honorable Richardson Dilworth, mayor of Philadelphia, will speak at the 10:55 a.m. service tomorrow in Schwab.

His topic will be "American Citizen's Role in the World Today."

The Chapel Choir, directed by Mrs. Willa C. Taylor, will sing "The Last Words of David" by Randall Thompson. Dr. Leonard Raver, chapel organist, will play music of composers connected with the Church of St. Clotilde in Paris.

"Chorale Number One in E Major" by Cesar Franck will be used for the prelude; "Communion" by Charles Tournemire will be played for the offertory; and the postlude will be "Gregorian Paraphrase on Te Deum" by Jean Langlais, present organist at St. Clotilde.

Mayor Dilworth, a member of the University's Board of Trustees, was graduated from Yale University Law School in 1926. He became active in politics in 1928 and was elected City Treasurer of Philadelphia in 1949. In 1951, he was elected District Attorney of the city. He has been mayor of Philadelphia for the past six years.

The Rev. Richard Martin, Episcopal chaplain to the University, will speak at the Protestant Service of Worship at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel. His sermon title will be "Knowing Christ."

The Meditation Chapel Choir, directed by James W. Beach, will sing "Turn Back, O Man" by Holst, Larry Handuerk, junior in science from Merchantville, N.J., will be the organist for the service.
