

Fees Due Dec. 8

Bills for the winter term University fees will be mailed to students tomorrow. The deadline for payment will be December 8.

"The statements will be sent to the student's home address if it is in the United States. However, if his home is outside of the country, the bill will be sent to his campus address," Richard H. Baker, bursar, said yesterday.

"If a student does not receive a bill at home or at the University by next Friday, he should check at the Bursar's office in 6 Willard," Baker said.

Students who do not pay their fees by December 8 will be sub-

ject to a \$25 late fee. If the check is sent through the mail it must be postmarked on or before December 8, he added.

"Those students who have a University scholarship or loan or a National Defense Student Loan may pick up their checks beginning November 27 in the student loan office in 6 Willard," Baker said.

These students will be able to sign any necessary forms concerning their loans or scholarships when they pick up their checks.

"All these checks should immediately be turned in at the Bursar's office," he said.

If the loan or scholarship is equal to, or less than, the student's fees, he can pay any necessary difference and receive his re-

ceived bill, Baker said.

If, however, the check is more than the student's fees, he should simply turn the check into the Bursar's office. He will receive his refund and receipted bill before he registers in January, Baker said.

Students who would like to defer fees may pick up deferment applications at the Bursar's office, he said. Up to 50 per cent of a student's University fees can be deferred. If deferment is approved, the student need only pay 50 per cent of his fees by the December 8 deadline. The remainder must be paid by February 5, Baker said.

Students who defer fees do not pay a late payment fee, he said. The only charge for deferment is a \$2 service fee for every \$100 or part thereof that is deferred, Baker added.

Cold Air to Stay

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3 Fraternities Penalized

Phi Delta Theta fraternity has been recommended for loss of social privileges for the remainder of the fall term and Sigma Phi Epsilon and Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternities have had rushing privileges removed for the remainder of the term by the Interfraternity Council Board of Control.

In addition to the removal of social privileges, Phi Delta Theta was also fined \$75 by the board.

The action stemmed from the theft of two University-owned lounge chairs by four members of the fraternity. This violated the social code rule which states that a fraternity is responsible for the conduct of its members, Thomas DeRocco, chairman of the board, said.

The recommendation must be approved by the Senate Subcommittee on Group Discipline, DeRocco said.

The four members involved are Jon Boyer, junior in the division of counseling from Avondale;

Bruce Campbell, senior in business administration from Philadelphia; Michael McCombs, junior in arts and letters from Pittsburgh; and David McKean, junior in mechanical engineering from Erie.

Sigma Phi Epsilon and Tau Kappa Epsilon have had rushing privileges removed only in regard to freshmen, DeRocco said, because they advertised open houses in violation of an IFC ruling.

All advertising concerning last Saturday's open houses was to be done by the IFC and the two fraternities involved violated this by advertising on their own, DeRocco said.

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
