

WRA Disqualifies 10 Teams

Ten teams, six sorority and four independent, will be disqualified from the intramural volleyball tournament sponsored by the Women's Recreation Association for using illegal players on their teams.

The WRA executive board took action last night and the teams will be officially disqualified when they receive written notification Tuesday, Melanie Smith, intramural chairman, said.

A team participant is considered an illegal player if she has not attended two practice sessions in the capacity she fills in the game, Miss Smith said. For example, Miss Smith explained, a girl who has signed in at two practices as a scorer may not be considered a legal player.

Miss Smith said there were other cases of players signing in at game time under an assumed name so that the team would not have to forfeit the game.

Those teams which were disqualified are Pi Beta Phi, Pollock 4, Alpha Chi Omega, Kappa Gamma, Alpha Phi, Kappa Delta, Simmons, Town, Phi Sigma Sigma and Lyons-Haller.

Barbara Newman, WRA president, said this action will help prove to participating teams that from now on intramural rules

will be strictly enforced. Previously, she said, WRA had been too lenient in enforcing them.

In other business, WRA executive board appointed Mary Lou Jackson, sophomore in physical education from Newton Square, to the position of sophomore representative.

Miss Jackson will replace Susanne Andresen, sophomore in arts and letters from West Englewood, N.J., who resigned from the position. A permanent representative will be chosen in WRA's February election.

Panhel Rush to Begin Tonight

Sorority rushing will begin at 6:10 tonight with about 1,600 rushees expected to attend the first open houses.

Open houses will run from 6:10 to 10:40 tonight and from 1 to 5:30 p.m. tomorrow and Sunday, Janet Carlisle, Panhel rush chairman, said last night.

"Rushees will spend 10 minutes

in each suite and have 10 minutes between each visit," Miss Carlisle said.

"Open houses are not a part of formal rush, but rushees will be required to attend each open house in order to re-register for formal rush in January," she added.

Open houses are the only part of rush to be held during the fall term, Miss Carlisle said.

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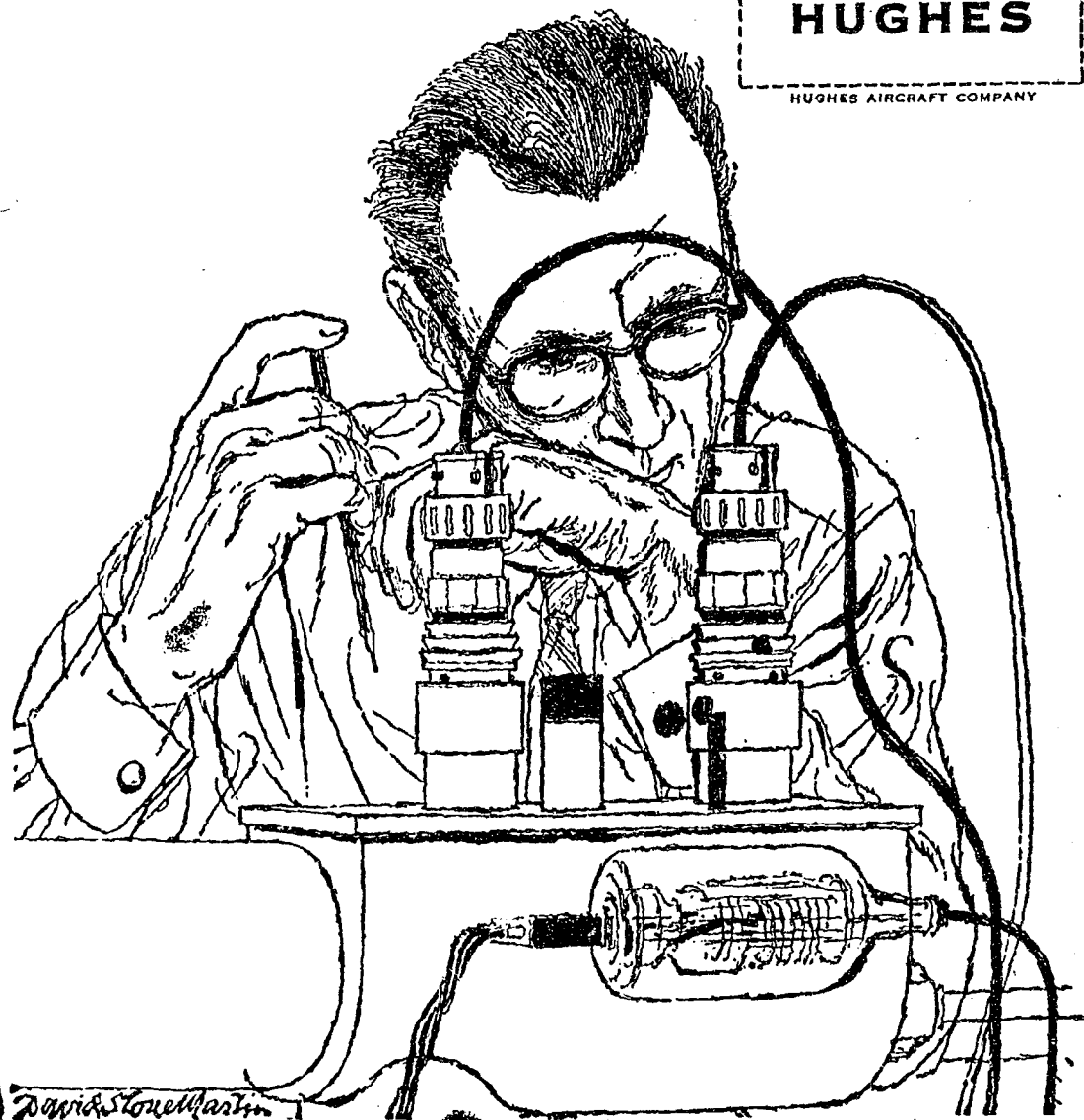
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
