

Phi Delts, Sleepers Win Fluke TD Aids Phi Delts IM Grid Championships

Football is called a game of inches and certainly Phi Delta Theta and the Sleepers will attest to that fact today.

The Phi Delts walked off with the IM fraternity football crown Sunday and the Sleepers squeaked-out a victory for the independent crown on the golf course fields, but both teams gained victory by the narrowest of margins.

Phi Delta Theta edged Phi Gamma Delta, 6-5 on first downs with the score knotted at six all, and the Sleepers took almost the same course, a 4-3 first-down victory over the Untouchables.

In the Phi Delt's victory, a first half outburst that picked-up five first downs was too much for Phi Gam. The winners scored their lone TD while completing 7 of 15 passes for 127 yards in the big first half.

With Bruce Campbell doing the quarterbacking and only seven minutes remaining in the first half, Phi Delt got its touchdown. Campbell fired a pass to Bill Shannon that was deflected into the waiting hands of Eldon "Boo" Reed who raced 59 yards for the first score of the game. The extra point attempt was no good.

Phi Gam came steaming back in the second half, however, to knot the score on a 53-yard pass from John First to Charlie Fink. Phi Gam also missed the extra point attempt.

Behind by a 6-3 first-down margin, Phi Gam marched for the quick first downs, but the clock ran out and with it went the championship.

First threw 15 passes and completed 10 for 136 yards in the second half, but a hard-changing line erased part of this total by throwing the Phi Gam quarterback for losses totaling 49 yards.

Chick Harte was the defensive standout for Phi Gam as he intercepted five passes, all but one of his team's total of six.

The independent game was mainly a defensive battle. The Sleepers could manage only 39 yards the entire game and the Untouchables gained even less, netting 35 yards.

Fine defensive play held the passing of both clubs in check. The champions completed 5 of 18 passes while the Untouchables clicked on 9 of 26.

The winning first down came with only three minutes left when Mike Yanefski scampered eight yards to give the Sleepers their fourth first down and the victory.

The play on which Phi Delta Theta scored the touchdown that helped it win the IM fraternity football championship Sunday won't be found diagrammed in any football play books.

Phi Delta Theta scored on a mishandled pass and even though Phi Gamma Delta came back to tie the game, Phi Delt had enough first downs to win.

Phi Delt scored when quarterback Bruce Campbell threw a pass intended for Bill Shannon. The ball bounced off Shannon's hands into the waiting arms of Eldon Reed, who was trailing

the play. Reed cuddled the pigskin and dashed 30 yards to the end zone to complete a 59-yard scoring play that certainly wasn't planned the way it happened.

The Phi Delts' defensive line of Jerry Slagle, Dave McKean, Dennis Feeney, and Bill Smith spent almost as much time in the Phi Gam backfield as some of the Phi Gam backs did. McKean, especially, was troublesome for Phi Gam quarterback John First.

In contrast to Phi Delt's touchdown, the Phi Gams scored on a perfectly executed 53-yard aerial from First to Charlie Fink in the second half. Campbell completed 11 of 28

passes, but six were intercepted, five by Chick Harte. Harte, although disheartened by the narrow loss, gave full credit to the victors. "It was a good game," Harte said. "We all played hard. We simply got beat by a better team. No excuses."

The Sleepers, independent champions, won their game on a rollout run by quarterback Mike Yanefski. Team captain Joe Shady said the Sleepers "had been working on that play all day. If the defender comes up," he said, "we pass, if not we run." In this case, the defense laid back and Yanefski ran eight yards for the winning first down.
