

# 2 Leaders Meet

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Kennedy and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer dug into their common problems yesterday in the first of a series of talks aimed at unity in the expected negotiations with the Soviet Union.

For an hour and 45 minutes the two government heads met face to face and privately—with only two interpreters present—as they explored their sometimes diverging views on how to deal with the Communists.

Then for 15 more minutes they examined the problem of West Berlin and other danger spots with their top government advisers.

Adenauer was accompanied by Kennedy as he emerged from the conference room. There was a faint smile on the chancellor's face—an unusual phenomenon, for he is known for his serious mien.

Kennedy, on the other hand, was unsmiling when he accompanied his guest to the waiting limousine. There, the two shook hands and Kennedy said: "See you again tomorrow."

The President then went back

into the White House without speaking to reporters.

Immediately after the chancellor left the White House this joint statement was read to reporters by Pierre Salinger, Kennedy's press secretary: "President Kennedy and Chancellor Adenauer met alone for one hour and 45 minutes and then for a brief period with the other members of the group who had been conferring separately during that period.

The two leaders reviewed the current situation in Berlin and Germany and current relations between the two countries. The talks will continue tomorrow morning.

Diplomatic informants leaving with the chancellor said they attached considerable importance to the fact that the two leaders met for an hour and 45 minutes alone.

The President and the chancellor will meet again at 11 a.m. today, and this talk will be followed by a White House luncheon.

After a brief rest, Adenauer will return to the White House at 4 p.m. for two more hours of talks. Tonight Adenauer will be host to Kennedy at an embassy dinner.

The two Western leaders, it is

estimated, will spend about eight hours in conferences, not counting a White House luncheon today.

Both the President and the chancellor are well prepared. Before Adenauer's arrival at the mansion on Pennsylvania Avenue, Kennedy was briefed for an hour by his top-level associates on the Soviet Union and Germany.

Adenauer, now 85, spent the entire morning in conferences with the ranking members of his party.

There is no agenda on the Kennedy-Adenauer talks, informants said, and diplomats added that even the chancellor's closest advisers do not know what tactics Adenauer will follow in the discussions.

# Governor May Call Legislative Session

HARRISBURG (AP)—Indications mounted at the state Capitol yesterday that the legislature may be called into special session early in December to study the thorny problem of congressional reapportionment.

"My understanding of the matter is that it would be cleared up within the first 10 days of December," said Rep. H. G. Andrews, speaker of the House.

However, he said he had no definite word on specific plans for a special session.

Gov. Lawrence is the only person who can call the legislature into session.

Pennsylvania loses three of its 38 congressional seats because of population shifts recorded in the 1960 national census. The 1961 legislature failed to agree on a reapportionment plan.

Without a law redividing the state's congressional districts, the commonwealth would have to elect all of its congressmen on an at-large basis under the terms of federal law.

Rumors circulated at the Capitol that lawmakers may be called into special session Dec. 11 to consider a reapportionment bill.

# 2 Trujillos Lead Florida Exodus

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, Dominican Republic (AP)—A surface calm settled on the Dominican Republic yesterday after the exodus of 29 members of the Trujillo dynasty.

But U.S. warships and Marines stood by their stations offshore around President Joaquin Balaguer's liberalized regime call for help.

Two brothers of the late dictator, Gen. Hector Trujillo, a former president, and Gen. Jose Amador Trujillo, who had his own army, led the exodus aboard a plane for Florida and their second exile in two months.

The return last week of the Trujillo brothers raised fears that they might try to seize power and set up a new dictatorship. Gen. Rafael L. Trujillo Jr., the dictator's son who had supported Balaguer's liberalization program, last week quit as armed forces chief and left the country, creating a power vacuum that led to Sunday's upheaval.

Gen. Pedro Rafael Rodriguez Echavarría, 37, commander of the Santiago air force base, led the forces that threw their support to Balaguer, deposed Sanchez, demanded the Trujillo brothers return to exile and beat down scattered army resistance.

But suspicion was aroused in Santiago by the appointment of Gen. Felix Herrida Jr. to succeed

Sanchez Herrida and Sanchez are known to be friends.

Any internal military struggle would have to contend with Balaguer's warning that it would lead to "foreign military intervention"—an obvious reference to the 14-ship Navy flotilla and Marine air units hovering offshore.

In Washington, it was learned the small task force includes an amphibious force of four ships, including the carrier Valley Forge, whose helicopters are intended to carry Marine landing parties ashore.

The two largest opposition factions, the National Civil Union and the 14th of June Movement, remained silent on whether they would now support Balaguer's program.

The opposition had refused to join in a coalition with Balaguer until top Trujillo family members of the military had been ousted.

**Samalenge Found Dead**  
ELISABETHVILLE, the Congo (AP)—Lukas Samalenge, 33, Katanga's minister of information, was found dead in the bush near Jadoville. Radio Katanga announced yesterday.

# Survivor Relates Story of 'Bluebelle'

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—The mystery surrounding the wreck of the ketch Bluebelle was exploded yesterday by a little girl's tale indicating the other passengers were slaughtered by a captain gone mad.

Terry Jo Duperrault, 11, who rode a tossing raft for 3½ days under a blazing sun, said Capt. Julian Harvey had abandoned her on the deck of the sinking ship.

The child told investigators she had seen the bodies of her mother and brother, Brian, on the bloody floor of the main cabin and "blood all over" the deck.

Harvey, 45, a powerful adventurer, killed himself by slashing his veins with a razor blade when he learned that Terry Jo had survived.

The blonde girl's father, Arthur Duperrault, 41, of Green Bay, Wis.; her mother, Jean, 38; her brother, Brian, 14, and Harvey's wife, Mary, 34, apparently went to the bottom with the 80-foot ketch, which Harvey escaped. He was rescued Nov. 13 by a freighter the day after the sinking.

Another sister, Renee, 7, was found dead in the dinghy in which Harvey escaped. They were rescued Nov. 13 by a freighter, SS Gulf Lion, the day after the sinking.

In Nassau, where Renee's body first was taken, a coroner reported her death due to drowning. At the time no questions had arisen over the sinking.

Terry Jo, riding a white cork

raft, was picked up last Thursday by the freighter Captain Theo.

Suspicions arose after Harvey's suicide, but not until Sunday was Terry Jo able to answer investigators' questions in a Miami hospital.



Then she told Coast Guard and FBI men a story of terror on a moonless night on the Atlantic 50 miles out of Nassau.

Capt. R. F. Barber, district Coast Guard officer in charge of marine investigations, related her story at a news conference.

Asked if he could state definitely that Harvey had killed the passengers and sunk the ship, Barber said any such announcement would have to await completion of the investigation.

He said he didn't know what

procedure would be taken on the case.
