
Camera Eye Covers Colorful Band Day




Sixty Bands Form PSU During Band Day Activities at Halftime of the Penn State - Holy Cross Game Saturday


got underway with a downtown parade at 9:30 a.m. Before the game at Beaver Stadium, 600 majorettes performed with the Blue Band. A total of 150 buses, 41 cars and 13 trucks were needed to get the students and their instruments to the field.


