Chapel Open House Set for Tomorrow

The University chaplain's office will hold an open house for all new students from 2 to 4 p.m. tomorrow in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel.

The reception will provide incoming freshmen and transfer students an opportunity to become acquainted with Dr. Luther H. Harshbarger, University chaplain, Clifford Nelson, assistant director of religious affairs, and other members of the chaplain's staff. Mrs. Laura Davis will serve as chapel hostess.

The **United Church of Christ** will sponsor a student Sunday School class at 9:30 a.m. followed by a worship service at 10:45 a.m. A supper for incoming students will be held at 5 p.m.

Hillel Foundation will hold a lox and bagel brunch at 10:30 a.m. tomorrow and a mixer and reception for new students at 7 p.m.

St. John's Evangelical United Brethren Church will conduct morning worship at 9:30 tomorrow and Bible study at 10:45 a.m. The EUB Fellowship will hold a dinner at 5 p.m. followed by a discussion on the topic "What Kind of Education Do You Want?"

The **Episcopal Student Group** will hold a pizza party at 4 p.m. tomorrow at the St. Andrew's parish house. At 6:30 p.m. there will be an Evensong and Epiphany service. The **Wesley Foundation** will hold a coffee hour at 8:45 a.m. tomorrow and worship at 9 a.m. followed by discussion groups at 9:30. Edgar Neely, sophomore in civil engineering from Treviso, will be leader for the worship service. **Westminster Foundation** will sponsor a reception for new students and seminars on "Christianity and Science," "Christianity and Contemporary Problems" and "The Unfolding Drama of the Bible." Study groups on "Worship" and "Social Action" will be held at 6:30 p.m.

Bicycle Inspection Begins Safety Drive

Beginning with an inspection program which will take place within two weeks the University will inaugurate a campaign to provide safer conditions for bicyclists on campus.

In addition to the inspection and registration of bicycles, which will be done on campus by State College police, the program calls for the construction of bicycle paths, designation of portions of existing paths and roads as bicycle paths and an educational program designed to acquaint cyclists, pedestrians and automobile drivers with the problem and proposed solutions.

There will be no charge for registering a bicycle, but the fee for the inspection and the registration tag is 50 cents.

To pass inspection, a bike must be equipped with brakes, a bell or horn and lights. It

also must be in good operating condition.

According to the bicycle regulations released by the Department of Security, bikes must be operated in compliance with all motor vehicle regulations, including the provision that they may not be operated on pedestrian sidewalks. Bicycles must be parked only in areas designated or reserved for them.

Any bicycles found on University property after the registration period without a tag will be treated as lost, abandoned or stolen. The campus patrol will impound all such bikes until they are claimed and registered by the owner. If this has not been done within 60 days, they will be disposed of as abandoned property.

The construction phases of the program will be undertaken in stages. Weather conditions and the availability of personnel will determine the rate of the operation. No construction will be undertaken until good weather prevails.

Harshbarger to Speak in Schwab

Dr. Luther H. Harshbarger, University chaplain, will be the speaker for the 10:55 a.m. service tomorrow in Schwab.

His topic will be "God and the Astrologers."

The Chapel Choir, directed by James W. Beach, will sing "Rorate Caeli Desuper" by Palestrina. Dr. Leonard Raver, chapel organist, will play "The Old Year Now Passeth," "Fantasia in G Major," "These Are the Holy Ten Commandments" and "In Thee Is Gladness" by J. S. Bach.

Harshbarger has been chaplain since 1954. He is currently a member of the Committee for Religion and Education of the American Council of Education, the National Association of College and University Chaplains, the National Academy of Religion and Mental Health and the Executive Committee of the Commission of Higher Education of the National Council of

Churches of Christ in the United States of America.

The Rev. Samuel N. Gibson, director of the University Christian Association, will give the sermon at the Protestant Service of Worship at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel. His topic will be "Insight into the Mystery."

Walker May Give Keynote Talk At Indie Encampment Saturday

President Eric A. Walker has tentatively agreed to give the keynote address at the 1962 Indie Encampment to be sponsored by the Independent Students Association Jan. 13 at the Civil Engineering Cabin.

The purpose of the encampment is to determine whether ISA will confine its activities to a social level or become the "voice of the independent students" on other planes, Barry Rein, president, said.

If ISA were to operate on a broader plane than at present, Rein said, it might concern itself with such things as the term system and the length of the break between classes, in hopes of making student reactions known to the administration.

In order to accomplish its purpose, the encampment will con-

sist of three workshops, Joelle Bronstein, co-chairman, said.

In one workshop, Dennis Foinini, student government president, will lead a discussion group about ISA and its relation to other student affairs, she said.

The second workshop, entitled "ISA Views Itself" to be led by Rein, will be a discussion of what the organization has accomplished.

The third workshop, led by Joseph Spatafore, ISA vice president and Pat Shockey, ISA representative to the Association of Women Students, will concern public relations and methods of increasing student interest in ISA. Miss Bronstein said.

She added that invitations to student leaders have been mailed. Other students interested in attending may register at the ISA office, 203 Hetzel Union.

Approximately 50 students are expected to attend, Rein said.
