

Undergrad Registration Hits 16,070

The total number of undergraduate students registering for the winter and spring terms reached 16,070, Dr. Robert G. Bernreuter, dean of admissions and registrar, announced yesterday.

Bernreuter said the figure topped registration figures for any of the previous spring semesters under the former semester plan. Last spring 14,643 undergraduate students registered at the University, he said.

"WE WERE PLEASED that registration proceeded so smoothly under the plan devised to accommodate the new 4-term plan," he commented. Under this plan, students register for the succeeding term at the same time they register for the present one.

The previous policy of having 10 days to drop or add courses was retained under the new plan.

"So far there has not been an excessive number of drop-adds," Bernreuter observed. "However, we will not know the exact number of cases until the end of the ten-day period because we do not count the number until all changes are completed."

The drop-add period ends Jan. 15.

ONE PROBLEM which was more prevalent than expected was that of changes in winter term schedules, he said.

"We are asking all students to hand in revised number two cards for the spring term," he said.

He said cards for the spring term will be processed in mid-January to give department heads time to make class adjustments.

EVEN WITH ALL the changes made, nearly 60 per cent of graduate students registered are completed registration without any trouble, he said. The exact number was 7,998.

Bernreuter said he foresees no major changes in the registration procedure for the summer term.

"We considered it a success," he said.

His office has no estimates as yet on the number of students expected to register for the summer term, he said. Students will be asked to fill out forms about their intentions later this month, he said.

No figures on the number of graduate students registered are available, he said. Graduate students followed a different registration procedure and their card envelopes were not stamped, he said. Because of this, the number of these registrants was not recorded, he said.

Series Will Present Cellist on Friday

Janos Starker, Hungarian-born cellist, and Janes Avery, pianist, will present the first winter term program of the University Artists' Series at 8:30 p.m. Friday in Schwab.

Student ticket distribution for the program will be from 1:30 to 5 p.m. today, and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. tomorrow through Friday at the Hetzel Union desk.

All students are entitled to one free ticket upon presentation of a matriculation card. Sale of tickets to the public at \$1.25 will begin at 9 a.m. Wednesday.

BORN IN BUDAPEST in 1924, Starker began to play cello when he was seven, making his first public appearance as a soloist at the age of ten. After graduating from the Budapest Academy of Music, he held the first cello chair in the Budapest Opera and Philharmonic Orchestra. In 1946, he left Hungary to tour Europe, and in 1948 came to this country.

Starker has been described by Time Magazine as a "cloudborne Grand Prix du Disque Inter-cellist," and by the Los Angeles national.

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
