

Ticket Distribution Continues for Series

More than half the student tickets are still available for the University Artists' Series presentation of Janos Starker, cellist, and Janes Avery, pianist, at 8:30 p.m. tomorrow in Schwab.

Student tickets, free upon presentation of a matriculation card, and general admission tickets at \$1.25 each will be available from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 to 5 p.m. today and tomorrow at the Hetzel Union desk.

Hungarian-born Starker, who has been playing the cello since he was seven, has been compared in skill with the noted cellist Pablo Casals. He has occupied the first cello chair in the Budapest Opera and Philharmonic Orchestras as well as several American orchestras.

STARKER HAS devoted much time to private teaching and acting as a travelling string consultant for many American community orchestras because he believes that the cello is many decades behind the violin in playing standards. At present he is on the faculty of Indiana University.

In an article in the June, 1961, issue of "HiFi Stereo Review," Starker explains that the cello has been traditionally used for filling in harmonies while the elegant melodic lines are played by the higher instruments.

As a result, the article said, the cellist has a great deal of time to squander on what he will, mainly watching the stage. Eventually, the opera cellist gets to know all the singers and ballet dancers by their legs, he wrote, and when the conductor does not notice his lack of attention to the music, his estimation of the conductor is lowered.

Because of the traditional reluctance to use the cello in important parts, Starker said in his article that there is a small demand and small appreciation for cellists.

"IN SOME INSTANCES, a beautiful girl who has a wealthy father falls in love with the creature behind the big fiddle, and that solves the boring problem of scratching out an existence. But there just aren't enough beautiful girls with wealthy fathers to go around," the article said.

As a result, most cellists are relatively unknown orchestra musicians, he said.

Welding Contest

A top prize of \$1,500 will be awarded to the student who submits the best welded machine or structure in a contest sponsored by the James F. Lincoln Arc Welding Foundation.

The contest, which is open to any engineering or architecture undergraduate, offers 46 cash awards totaling \$10,000.

SGA Deletes Court Clause

Members of the interim SGA Assembly met Tuesday night and decided to delete a clause dealing with the Supreme Court's powers in the proposed Undergraduate Student Government (USG) constitution.

THE CLAUSE gave the USG Supreme Court the authority to declare unconstitutional any action taken by a student organization which is in violation of the USG constitution.

After a short discussion, it was decided by the group that the clause in question was repetitious and could be deleted without any harm to the document because of the wording of the previous sentence in the Constitution.

This sentence states that "it is further the intent of this constitution to constitute these officers, Congress and Court as having final authority on all matters of an All-University nature."

THE REVISED constitution will be presented at the next meeting of the Senate Committee on Student Affairs and will be ready for student ratification in the coming student government elections (Jan. 23-25). SGA President Dennis Foianini said last night.
