

Committee Charters OSGA, Keystone

The Organization of Student Government Associations and the Keystone Society were recently chartered by the Senate Committee for Student Affairs, Robert Fisher, OSGA president said last night.

"OSGA acts as a liaison agency between Student Government Associations of the centers and campuses of the University without possessing any legislative authority," Fisher said.

The Student Government Association president and a student leader from other campus compose the membership of OSGA, Fisher said. An administrator from each campus attends the meetings but does not vote, he added.

OSGA HAS BEEN active since 1960 and although unchartered has been permitted to have three meetings each year plus a summer workshop at the University Park campus, Fisher said.

Improvement of inter-campus communications, primarily through exchange of publications has been a major project of OSGA, he said. The organization is currently working toward extending the student insurance program of the University Park campus to the Commonwealth campuses.

The Keystone Society, which

was suggested at an OSGA workshop, is a recognition society to stimulate interest and participation in the co-curricular (academic and activities) life at the campuses, Fisher said.

Each campus wishing to start a Keystone Society must have its charter approved by its local committee for student affairs.

"I DOUBT THAT A Keystone Society will be started here," Fisher said, "because of the vast number of activities we have."

"It is hoped, however, that comparable societies existing on other campuses will become chapters of The Keystone Society."

Light Snow, Mild Temperatures Forecast for Today, Tomorrow

The occasional snow that began Wednesday night finally ended yesterday morning after accumulating to a depth of 1.5 inches.

More snow, but no accumulation is expected today.

Mild air, which has produced abnormally warm weather in the southern and eastern states during the past several days, should move into the northeastern states today.

However, a layer of cold air that remains in the lower few thousand feet of the atmosphere over Pennsylvania will prevent the Commonwealth from feeling the full affects of this mild air.

As the warm air is forced to ascend over the cold air, clouds and light precipitation will result.

Today should be mostly cloudy and milder with occasional light

snow this morning and light rain possible this afternoon. A high of 37 is expected.

Partly cloudy and milder weather is indicated for tonight and tomorrow. A low of 30 is predicted for tonight, and a high of 42 is forecast for tomorrow.

Colder weather should return on Monday.
