

# 2-Day Conference Planned by OSGA

Thirty seven delegates from the University's 14 campuses will meet here Friday and Saturday for the winter term session of the Organization of Student Government Associations.

"OSGA acts as a liaison agency between the Student Government Associations of the various centers and campuses of the University without possessing any legislative authority," Robert Fisher, OSGA president, said yesterday.

REED FERGUSON, director of University relations, will give the keynote address on the role of the student in helping the University obtain state appropriations, Fisher said last night.

After an informal reception in the Hetzel Union lounge and a dinner in the HUB dining room, the delegates will break up into two workshops to discuss orientation programs.

Representatives from campuses which have only two year courses of study, will discuss "Improvement of Orientation Week at Commonwealth Campuses." The rest of the delegates will consider "Improvement of Orientation Week for Transfer Students at University Park."

THE SECOND ROUND of workshops Friday, will consider the effects of the four-term system.

"OSGA sent questionnaires to every campus, so we expect to have the opinions of about 3,000 students on the four-term system," Fisher said. "A capsule report from each campus will be presented to Robert G. Bernreuter, special assistant to the president for student affairs, Saturday."

Bernreuter will present administrative comments on the four-term system Saturday, Fisher said. "This session will be a wrap-up of progress reports from each campus on summer conference projects," he said.

Delegates will report on whether their campuses would like to participate in a proposed student insurance program and also their progress on standardizing SGA awards.

# 4 Fined for Minor Disturbances

Four students were arrested on minor charges over the weekend by State College police. At hearings before Justices of the Peace William P. Bell and Guy G. Mills, all four pleaded guilty and were fined.

BELL FINED Wayne Burtnett, sophomore in meteorology from Yeadon; Theodore Butcher, freshman in liberal arts from Glen Cove, N.Y., for their participation in a disturbance in Humes Alley Friday night. Bell said they had been throwing beer cans and other debris at the facade of a

local bar. Bell said all three paid \$16.50 in fines and costs. He also said Burtnett was found guilty, by his own statement, of violating the borough minor's ordinance, which makes it illegal for a minor to purchase alcoholic beverages. Burtnett was fined an additional \$36.50 for this violation.

MARK GREENFIELD, freshman in liberal arts from Philadelphia, was fined by Mills Saturday for also violating the minor's ordinance. He was assessed \$36.50 in fines and costs.
