

# WRA Primaries Set for Tuesday

Candidates for six positions on the WRA Executive Board were announced yesterday by Patti Sutter, chairman of the elections committee.

Primary elections will be held Tuesday for all offices except that of president. Since Nancy Barnhart, junior in elementary and kindergarten education from Pittsburgh, is running unopposed for president, there will be no primary election for this office.

## 2 Freshmen Fined For Buying Beer

Two students were fined Tuesday by Justice of the Peace Guy G. Mills for violation of a borough ordinance which makes it illegal for a minor to buy or attempt to buy any alcoholic beverage.

At a preliminary hearing Alfred G. Krebs, freshman in counseling from Norristown and Ronald J. Tine, freshman in education from Windsor, Conn., pleaded guilty to charges of having violated the ordinance last Saturday night. Both said they had not been asked for identification when they purchased a pitcher of beer at a local tavern.

Mills said he imposed the minimum fine of \$25 plus \$11.50 costs after the arresting officer testified that both Krebs and Tine had been cooperative at the time of their arrest.
