# Pattee Library Displays Indonesian Play Masks

Many of the masks now on display at the Pattee Library are faces in a play, James F. McDivitt, assistant professor of mineral economics said recently. The masks will be on display until Feb. 17.

Many of the masks now on display at the Pattee Library are reproductions in full color of paintings in the collection of President Sukarno of Indonesia, published by the Communist government of China and presented to him as a gesture of friendship.

McDivitt loaned the collection to the library. He collected the tribal masks during a recent five-year stay in Indonesia where he was head of the Department of Geology at the University of Indonesia in Bandung, Java. His wife taught English and nursing to groups of Indonesian women.

"THE PROPOSAL having the most support among the delegates at the moment is to have an appointive board that would undertake planning and undertake counseling the Legislature on how available financial support should be allocated among the several institutions.

"It would have no authority over the public colleges and universities themselves, but would be advisory in nature only. Of course, the fate of this proposal remains to be seen but at least we have some evidence of a growing recognition that better planning would be highly desirable."

# AWS Election Code Clarified On Dining Area Campaigning

Dining hall supervisors have been requested not to allow electioneering in the dining rooms. Robert C. Proffitt, director of food service, said last night.

Proffitt was asked to clarify the policy after reports that candidates for Association of Women Students' offices were talking with students in the dining halls.

Under a long-standing policy, Proffitt said, candidates may campaign while students are waiting in line for meals.

"MEALTIME ITSELF is not the time for campaigns, whether for votes, charity or any other purpose," he added.

The campaign policy results from discussions between the Department of Housing and Food Service, the dean of men and the dean of women, he said.

"Students at meals are a cap-

tive audience," Proffitt said. "In consideration of them while they are eating, we do not desire any electioneering within the dining halls." The AWS election code does not specifically prohibit this form of campaigning. It does, however, say that no candidate may place notices on dinner tables or in mail boxes. Campaigning prior to Proffitt's clarification will not therefore be considered a code violation, Carol Tomlinson, co-chairman of the elections committee, said.

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# Debate Squad Will Meet Kings On KDKA-TV Show Tonight

The University Men's Debate Squad will meet Kings College, Wilkes-Barre, in a televised debate at 10:30 this evening.

If victorious, the charges of Coaches Ronald Nicoson and David Jabusch will gain an opportunity to meet Ohio State in a future televised match.

The University team, composed of seniors William F. Stout, of Pittsburgh, and David R. Goodhart, of Rutherford, N.J., will argue the affirmative of the question, "Resolved, That the Federal Government Should Initiate and Finance a Fall Out Shelter Program in the United States."

The debate will be televised by KDKA-TV, Channel 2 in Pittsburgh. Students may watch the match locally by tuning in Channel 22.

The debate is one in a series of college debates, called "Counterpoint," televised over KDKA-

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
