

Tickets Available For Sevareid Talk

Eric Sevareid, CBS news analyst and broadcasting correspondent, will speak on "The Shape of Things to Come" at 8:30 p.m. Saturday in Schwab.

Student tickets for his talk, sponsored by the University Lecture Series, will be distributed from 1:30 to 5 p.m. today and 9 to 12 a.m. and 1 to 5 p.m. tomorrow and Friday at the Hetzel Union desk. Tickets for the general public at \$1.25 each, will go on sale at 9 tomorrow morning.

Sevareid, stationed in London since 1959, is narrator for the weekly program, "CBS Reports," and also appears on other CBS radio and television news programs.

DURING WORLD War II Sevareid landed with the first wave of American troops in southern France and spent the first years of the war reporting events in the European theater. He continued broadcasting from Paris, Rome and London until 1943.

During the remainder of the war, he was assigned to the China-Burma-India theater. At one time he was forced to bail out of a plane in the jungle and, after being lost with 19 others, was

rescued and guided back to civilization by headhunters.

After the war, he returned to the United States to cover the founding of the United Nations and the San Francisco Conference. He also reported three Presidential elections, in 1948, 1952 and 1956, for CBS news.

BEFORE HIS assignment in London, Sevareid spent 10 years in Washington, later attaining the position of chief CBS Washington correspondent.

During 1957 and '58, he was science reporter for the "Conquest" series of programs on CBS, based on current advances in fields of science.

Sevareid was born in Velva, North Dakota, and began his newspaper career at 18 on the Minneapolis Journal. He studied political science at the University of Minnesota.

Building Council Pickets Water Tunnel Contractor

Pickets were stationed at the Garfield Thomas Water Tunnel on N. Atherton St. and Pollock Rd. by the Centre County Building and Construction Trades Council again yesterday to protest against work being done there by a Martinsburg contractor.

General and electrical contractor W. Floyd Bush is working on the water tunnel under a U.S. Navy Bureau of Yards and Docks contract.

Robert Klinefelter and David Perryman of Bellefonte, two of the pickets assigned by the council to the water tunnel, said that Bush is a non-union contractor who is not meeting the prevailing wages in the area.

"WE ARE PICKETING against Bush because he is breaking down working conditions in this area," R. T. Willard, secretary-treasurer of the council, said.

The Bureau of Yards and Docks said they had been advised of the picketing at the water tunnel, but since there was no interference with personnel entering or leaving, they were not contemplating any action.

-AN OFFICIAL OF the Bureau said that since Bush had met the requirements for bidding on the contract and had been the low bidder, it was awarded to him.

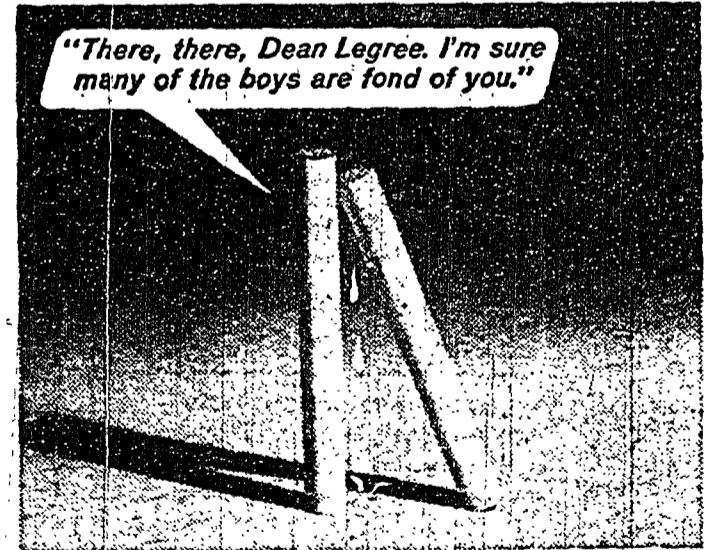
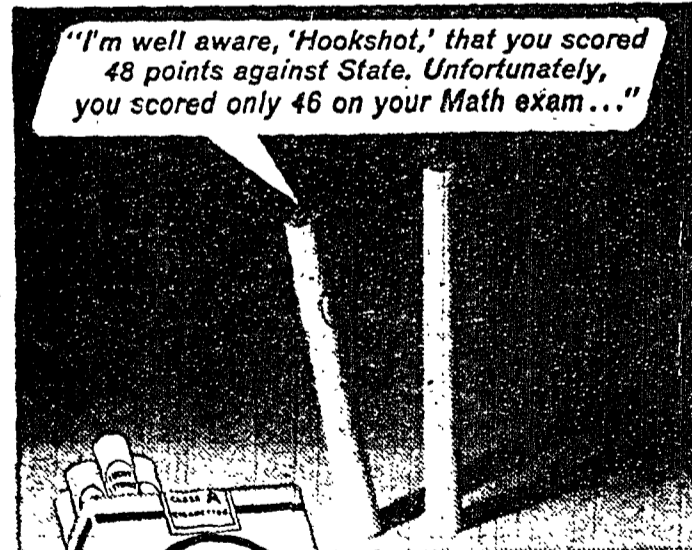
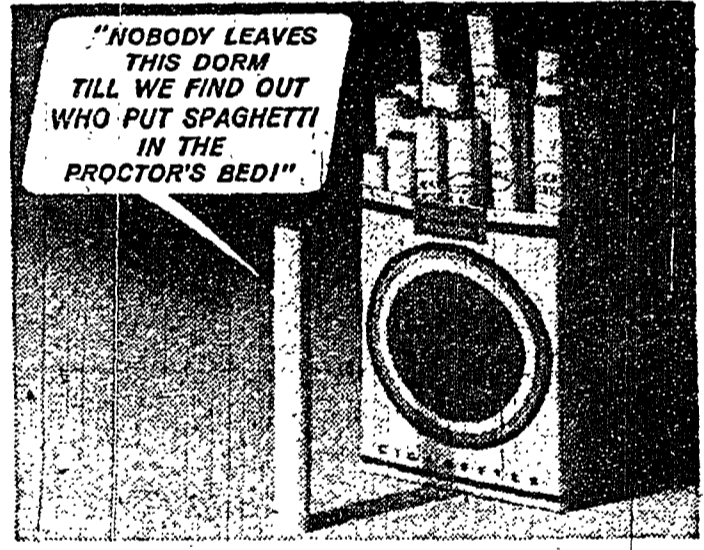
