

Students Will Discuss Disarmament

Students interested in the problems and promise of alternatives to the international arms race may attend the first Intercollegiate Conference on Disarmament and Arms Control held today through Sunday at Swarthmore College, Dr. Marvin E. Rozen, assistant professor of economics, said yesterday.

The conference will be led by 21 authorities concerned with research and decision-making in this field.

Although the conference begins today, registration is also being held from 7:30 to 9 a.m. tomorrow. Originally, two students were invited from each of 150 universities. More students, however, are encouraged to attend, Rozen said.

THE CONFERENCE registration fee is \$10. Participants will be expected to pay for their own

meals, but free lodging will be provided in homes of Swarthmore community residents.

"I'm sure no interested students will be turned away from the conference," Rozen said.

The conference is designed to inform students about the controversial issues and proposals that divide American experts. It should also encourage students to become more conscious and thoughtful about their roles in the search for international stability and order, the Swarthmore News Office said.

THE DISARMAMENT authorities will direct seminars of 15 to 20 students each as the core of the conference. The scholars will present preliminary statements on their subjects to the seminars.

These seminars, which will be the focus of tomorrow's activity, will cover such topics as problems

of inspection in arms control, the economics of armament and disarmament, treaty negotiations and problems of treaty ratification plus the three possibilities: deterrence, disarmament and arms control.

Sen. Joseph S. Clark, D-Pa., will deliver the keynote address at 8 tonight.

THOMAS C. SCHELLING of the Harvard Center for International Affairs and author of "Strategy and Arms Control" will speak tomorrow morning.

The roster of speakers reads like a "Who's Who" in disarmament, the Swarthmore News Office said. Also included are Professor Seymour Melman, author of the recent best seller, "The Peace Race," and Homer A. Jack, executive director of the National Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy.

The article was based on research into attitudes of newspaper advertising managers about the training and education that they seek in hiring personnel for newspaper advertising jobs.

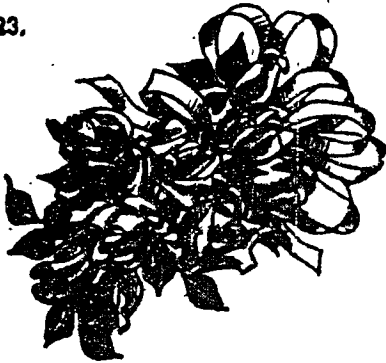
Dr. Hicks is on leave of absence from the University to serve as visiting associate professor of marketing at the University of Utah.
