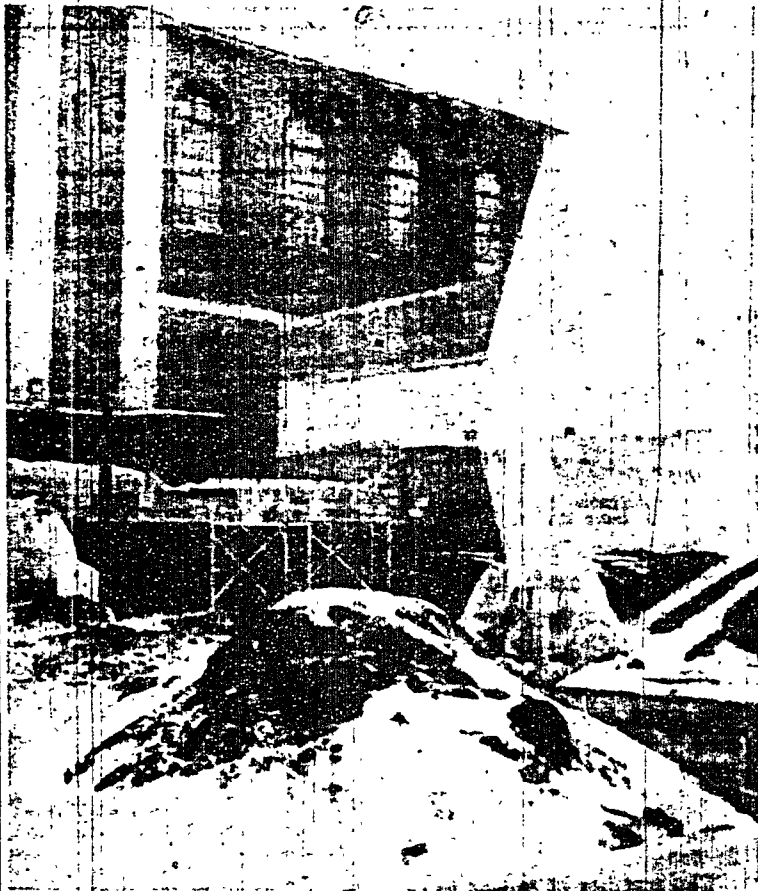
Tickets may be purchased at \$5 per couple at the Hetzel Union desk from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily.

Buddy Morrow was born in New Haven, Conn., and received his first trombone at the age of twelve. Three years later he toured the east coast with a small combo.

Upon graduation from high school, Morrow attended Juillard School of Music for one year, but financial conditions forced him to leave school and work with small combos at night.

In 1951, Buddy Morrow formed his first dance band which has become renowned in the music field for its versatility of sound.

In 1952, the Morrow orchestra recorded the song "Night Train" which sold over a million copies. The orchestra has also recorded several successful albums including "A Mint Julep," "The Golden Trombone," and "Tara's Theme."

The Department of Theatre Arts will present "A Sleep of Prisoners" and Bagwell, graduate student in theater arts from Chicago, Ill., day, in the St. Andrews Episcopal Church. The stage manager is Linda Freid, junior in arts from Pottsville.

The play, written by Christopher Fry, concerns four soldiers who find themselves locked in a church during wartime. Through a dream fantasy, the soldiers identify themselves with such Biblical characters as Cain and Abel, Isaac and Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego.

The cast features Alfred Gordon, sophomore in arts and letters from Summit, N.J., and Michael Goff, junior in secondary education from Shenandoah. Also in the cast are James Werner, sophomore in the division of counseling from Pittsburgh, and Martin Petlock, freshman in liberal arts from Philadelphia.

Teaching Next Best To Rich Wife—Barth

To John Barth, assistant professor of English composition, teaching is just a "front." It is the "most comfortable position" to hold when one prefers literary writing over any other career, he said.

Teaching is the "next best thing to marrying a wealthy woman," Barth said, because it offers you a means to earn a living and a great deal of spare time in which to write.

"I don't know of any other job in which one can work three mornings a week, thirty weeks a year and get every seventh year off with pay. The University is very accommodating," he commented.

IF A "FRONT" is to be successful, however, it has to be brought off well, Barth said. He explained:

"To put it in other words, I must be a good teacher."

Barth, who has been on the University faculty ever since his graduation from Johns Hopkins University in 1952 with a master of arts degree, has published three books. "The Sol-Weed Factor," his most recent one, was reviewed by Time Magazine as "that rare literary creation—a genuinely serious comedy."

The book is a satirical novel on the history of Maryland before the Revolutionary War.

IN AN ARTICLE in the Johns Hopkins Magazine, Barth wrote: "A story-teller is likely to have a limited reverence for facts, he being in essence a professional liar." He continued, "Graduate students and critics unnerve me; they are more learned than I and can't believe how much a writer operates by 'hunch' and 'feel.'"

"One writes in a journal, for example, that I have been influenced by Otto Rank's 'Birth of the Ritual Hero.' I go read Rank's book to see, and what do you think? The critic is right."

Players Cast Leading Roles For 2 Dramas

Arthur Sokolove and Harry Kunesch will be featured in the Penn State Players' production of "Man of Destiny" and "Krapp's Last Tape" April 6 at Center Stage.

Sokolove, junior in psychology from Philadelphia, will play Napoleon Bonaparte in George Bernard Shaw's comedy, "Man of Destiny."

Kunesch, graduate student in theater arts from Bridgeport, Conn., will be the sole character in John Beckett's play about a man who relives his life with a tape recorder.

The two one-act plays are being directed by Warren Smith, associate professor of theater arts.

Also in the cast of Shaw's play are Nedra Clay, graduate student in theater arts from Mount Vernon, Ill.; David Griffiths, senior in secondary education from Johnstown, and Robert Valanty, sophomore in hotel and food service from Ringtown.

Sokolove has appeared in the Players' productions of "The Cave Dwellers" and "Witness for the Prosecution."
