**Rockwell Delays Beta Sigma Omicron, Lewisburg Talk Requests Local Status Until Sunday**

Cold weather and the possibility of snow forced a one week postponement of a talk scheduled for Sunday by George Lincoln Rockwell, head of the American Nazi party, in Lewisburg.

In announcing the postponement, Rockwell added that most of the persons at his Arlington, Va., headquarters appeared to be coming down with the flu. He said his present plans are to ask for a renewal of the permit to use the Lewisburg post office steps as a speaking platform and if granted, he plans to speak this Sunday at 2 p.m.

He said he didn't expect any trouble in getting the permit renewed. The topic of his speech will be "Tyranny at Bucknell." The Nazi leader first attempted to speak at Lewisburg Feb. 4, without a speaking platform and loud speaker system. Before getting started he was booed and jeered out of town.

Commenting on the possibility of this situation occurring again this Sunday, he said he did not think there would be any trouble. His headquarters had expected a crowd of about 15,000 to attend had the talk been given this past Sunday.

The group of coeds who were formerly affiliated with Beta Sigma Omicron, national sorority, are petitioning to become officially recognized by the University as Gamma Colony, a local sorority.

Dean of Women Dorothy J. Lipp explained that the purpose of the petition is to enable the group to remain an organization on campus and to give it a name. She said there are financial assets, such as a bank account, furniture and savings bonds which the group must dispense with before disbanding.

**THE GROUP** received permission from the Senate Committee on Student Affairs to withdraw its national charter at the end of the spring term. One week after the national organization was notified, the national president arrived on campus, and instead of waiting until the end of the year, the deactivation took place immediately.

The Senate Sub-Committee on Organizational Control heard the petition last week, but Alex Black, chairman of the committee, declined to comment on its recommendation.

Black said the sub-committee is only a recommending body and that its recommendation will now go along with the group's petition to the Senate Committee on Student Affairs. This committee is scheduled to meet sometime this week.

**THERE IS A possibility.** Dean Lipp said, of a small interested group of coeds combining with the former members of Beta Sigma Omicron in the new Gamma Colony.

This would mean, she explained, that the new group could absorb all the assets of the former branch of the national sorority.

In discussing the chances of the new colony joining a national group, Dean Lipp mentioned two possibilities.

All of the national sororities which are now on campus are members of the National Panhellenic Congress, Dean Lipp said. She added that there is only one remaining member of NPC that isn't on this campus which is eligible to be accepted by the University.

**IN ORDER TO** be accepted by the University there must be no written discriminatory clause in the organization's constitution.

The other possibility, Dean Lipp said, is a new national sorority forming in the New England states. The group's main policy is to accept members of any race religion or creed, Dean Lipp explained. She said she felt this group is worth watching.

**Snow Pelts Nation; Skips Pennsylvania**

Pennsylvania escaped a major snowstorm over the weekend, but a large portion of the nation did not.

Heavy snow fell from the Dakotas to new England and average accumulations range from 6 to 18 inches. Some sections of South Dakota report more than 30 inches of new snow.

As the storm responsible for the heavy snows passed north of here yesterday, some sleet and freezing rain was observed. Colder weather and snow flurries were expected in the wake of the storm last night.

Today should be mostly cloudy, windy and cold with a few snow flurries. A high of 30 is expected.

Partly cloudy and cold weather is indicated for tonight and tomorrow. Tonight's low should be near 20, and a high of 34 is likely tomorrow.

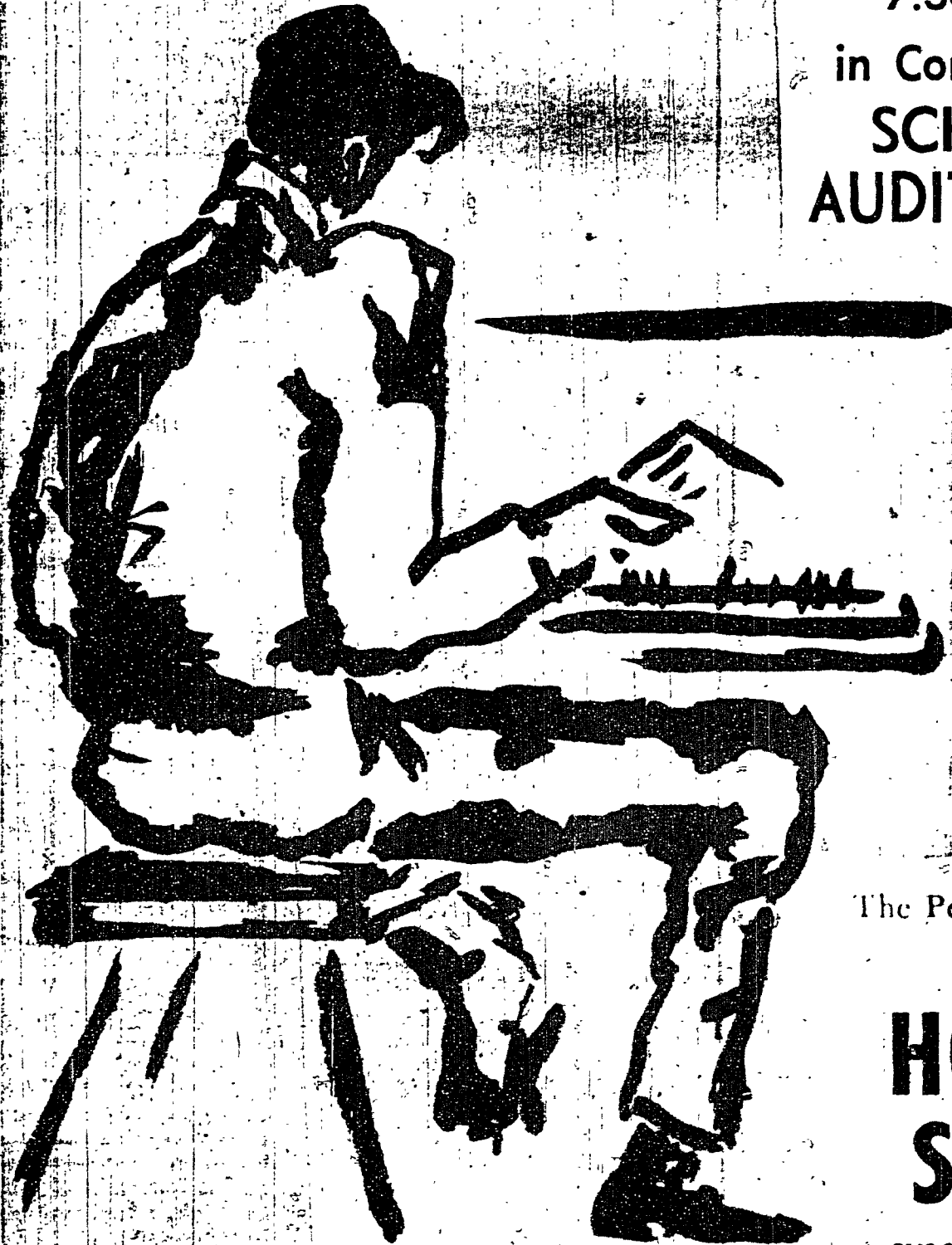
