## Feingold, Grace Named To Head USG Agencies

The appointments of Allen Feingold as chairman of the elections commission and Harry Grace as head of the USG Public Relations Agency were announced yesterday by USG President Dennis Foianini.

The two appointments have been sent to the USG Congress where a majority of the Congressmen must approve presidential appointments before they become effective. These appointments are on the agenda for Congressional action tomorrow night.

Feingold, a junior in psychology from Wynnwood, has worked with the elections commission during the last two years, Foianini said.

"I HAVE SEEN him perform and have been impressed with his talents. Feingold was one of several persons recommended to me for the position by the outgoing commission chairman, Nancy Williams," Foianini said.

Feingold said he thinks this year's spring elections will differ from those in other years since the executive branch of the government will be elected under the new representation system of the new constitution for the first time. Some changes will undoubtedly have to be made in the spring election procedure because of the new constitution, he explained.

"Harry Grace (junior in liberal arts from Rushland) is a very personable guy; he is quiet and thoughtful and I'm sure he can do a good job as head of the Public Relations Agency," Foianini said.

GRACE COMMENTING on his appointment, said, "I will try to do everything I can to better USG's student relations on campus."
