The Congress will also consider the recent executive appointments of President Dennis Folanini and those of the rules committee chairman, George Gordon.

Folanini has appointed Allen Feingold as elections commission chairman, Harry Grace to the Public Relations Agency and Sue Zengerle as the Congress' parliamentarian.

GORDON HAS appointed Fred Good, fraternity area representative, Stuart Liner, TIM area representative, Anne Morris, North Halls representative and Murray Winderman, West Halls representative, as members of the USG Rules Committee.

A majority of the Congressmen must approve these appointments before the appointees can take office.

In other business, the Congress will continue discussion of the proposal of William Lott, congressman from Pollock Halls, to publicize the University's budget dilemma. The bill was taken up at last week's meeting but was tabled until this week after several congressmen spoke against it as it was presented at that time.

## UNITED WE STAND
