

Carnival Applications Available Monday Afternoon at HUB Desk

Applications for groups wishing to enter the Spring Week carnival will be available Monday afternoon at the Hetzel Union desk, Robert Polishook, chairman, said last night.

A MINIMUM of five countries must be requested by the groups in preferential order when the application is turned in, Polishook said.

The theme of the carnival is "Wide, Wide World."

The applications may be turned in at 8 a.m. Thursday to Paul Krow, carnival chairman, at the HUB desk. Polishook said the countries will be assigned to competing groups on a "first come, first-served" basis. The countries will then be listed alphabetically and divided by three to determine the categories.

A GENERAL LETTER containing the various Spring Week events and dates will also be available with the applications. Polishook added that the preliminaries for the he-man and queen-of-hearts contests will be held Thursday, April 26 and the finals Sunday, April 29.

Missile Flight Studied

Earthbound simulation of a missile's behavior in flight is being studied by University electrical engineers in a research program supported by the U.S. Army Ordnance District, Philadelphia.

The agency recently renewed its support with a \$15,000 grant for six months. Dr. Carl Volz, professor of electrical engineering, is in charge of the project.

March Grads Billed in Error

Students planning to graduate in March should ignore any bill sent to them for spring term fees, Richard H. Baker, bursar, said yesterday.

Although the bursar's office does not prepare the bills, (this is done by the date processing service) Baker said, he imagined that the names of the graduating seniors had not yet been pulled out when the bills were made up.

This was confirmed by Harry A. Sperber, manager of the date processing service.

The bill sent to students is always only an "estimated bill" and it is up to the student to make the proper adjustments, such as scholarships, etc. and report the amount due to the bursar's office.

University Alum Given Corps Post

Dr. Roderic E. Buller of Allentown, an alumnus of the University, was recently named Peace Corps representative for Venezuela by Sargent Shriver, Peace Corps director.

Buller will be in charge of 90 volunteers who will begin training in the spring for three agricultural projects in Venezuela. He will be stationed in Caracas.

A graduate in chemistry and economics from Lafayette College in Easton, Buller received his master's degree in plant breeding and doctor's degree in agronomy and held a graduate research assistantship while working for his advanced degrees here.

He has been employed for the past nine years as an argonomist for the Rockefeller Foundation agriculture program in Mexico.

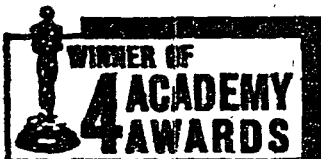
all academic ranks. The range of full professors' salaries reported was from \$6,696 to \$13,824, for associate professors from \$5,300 to \$10,240, for assistant professors from \$4,104 to \$9,070 and for instructors from \$3,780 to \$7,344.

The highest paid instructor reporting, Brewster said, receives \$648 more a year than the lowest paid full professor. This wide range of salaries within ranks and the great overlap that exist are factors that tend to place the University low on the AAUP's salary-rating scale, he said.

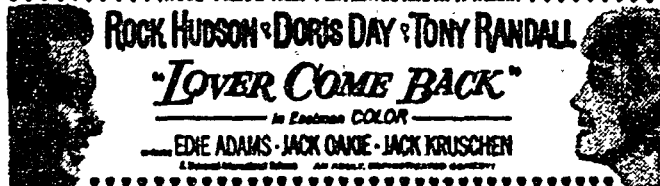
