

Civil Defense Team Completes Survey

The reports on campus buildings which were completed by the HRB-Singer fallout shelter team yesterday afternoon will be sent next week to the Department of Public Works in Philadelphia, John Chernega, director of the team, said yesterday.

The team has been collecting data on campus for the past 10 days. The data should eventually show which buildings on campus may be suitable for use as fallout shelters.

The reports will be checked in Philadelphia and then sent to either Suitland, Md., or Jeffersonville, Ind., to have the information tabulated on computing machines. The results will be sent to the state and local Civil Defense directors in about eight weeks, Chernega said.

MOST OF THE BUILDINGS on campus had to be examined because there was not enough written information on the terrain around the buildings, he said.

Radiation from fallout on the

ground around the building may affect the protection offered in the building, he said.

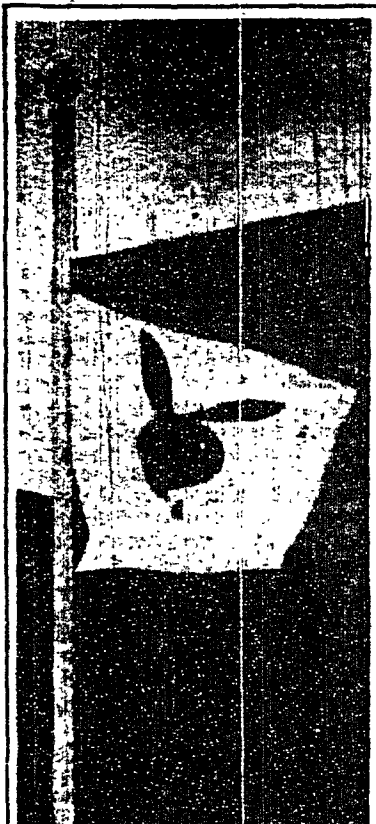
Nearby buildings would shield the area from some fallout, he said. The position of neighboring buildings as well as all the structural details of each building must therefore be reported by the team.

The team reports next to Williamsport in Lycoming County. This will be the fourth county to be surveyed in this district. The team has been assigned a 10-county area to survey, Chernega said.
