## Review

# 'Bells' Lacks Direction

Collegian Reviewer "Bells Are Ringing," by Betty Comden and Adolf Green, is running this weekend at Schwab by the sheer strength of a highly talented, though completely undirected cast.

The show, purely light and fanciful entertainment, hurtles headlong and helter-skelter through almost a complete range of the musical comedy repertoire.

THE LEADING members of the cast seem equally adept at carrying a line as well as a song and in individual scenes the transition from speech to vocal numbers is generally smooth.

There is, however, a total lack

of continuity in the show, which highlights the individual talents of the actors at the expense of the overall forward movement of the production.

It seems at times to lapse into some kind of impromptu variety show centered around whoever happens to be on stage at any particular moment.

THE UNEVEN QUALITY of set design and construction further contributes to a makeshift air.

Most sets are constructed of a great amount of soft, sound absorbing materials which, coupled with mismanagement of curtains and backdrops—never seeming to quite get on or off the stage—

makes it difficult for many actors to be heard.

Carrie Fishbein, as Ella Peterson an employe of Susanswerphone service who cannot resist "helping" each client and in the process falls in love with one of them, is a resourceful actress who is a master of a wide range of emotional expression through subtle gesture.

The clear quality of her voice and her ability to project it to the entire audience makes her performance one of the most enjoyable in the show.

ROBERT EEK, as Sandor a conniving bookie who uses the answering agency for his own purposes, plays his role with exuberance while imparting to his scenes precision of body and vocal expression.

Nancy Alinkoff, cast in the role of Sue, owner of Susanswerphone is cast in a relatively subdued role in relation to other more flamboyant characters. This allows the production to benefit by the needed underpinning of an experienced thespian.

Allan Just, as Jeff Moss, a playboy writer who is the object of Ella's affections, handles his part adequately. His acting lacks an element of constant purposefulness however, which leaves him often at the mercy of clever "upstaging" by the alert Miss Fishbein.

# University-Trained Corpsmen Now On Location in Philippines

One hundred and eighty-two, or 22.8 per cent, of the 801 Peace Corps volunteers now overseas are products of the Philippine training program at the University.

Richard Graham, special assistant to Peace Corps Director Sargent Shriver, said during a recent visit here, that the program on campus is the only program maintained by the Peace Corps on a year-long basis.

Graham added that he was not yet certain that the program would continue beyond July 1 because of demands for volunteers from countries other than the Philippines.

THE UNIVERSITY is now in the third stage of its program.

Forty-nine volunteers from 20 different states will remain here until March 17 preparing for service as teaching aides assignments in the Philippines.

One hundred and twenty-eight "graduates" are already teaching in the Islands. Fifty-four others are completing their training at a Philippine Peace Corps school. The Peace Corps hopes to prepare almost 3,000 more volunteers for a variety of assignments by mid-June, Graham said. He said that the demand for teachers comprises about 60 per cent of all requests received.

Countries have also urgently asked for agricultural specialists, mechanics and persons with other technical skills, Graham added.
