

Frosh Dismissed; 4 Men Penalized

A freshman was dismissed from the University by the Senate Sub-Committee on Discipline for stealing money from a student in his residence hall and attempting to "frame" another student for the theft, Daniel R. Leasure, assistant dean of men, said.

THERE HAD BEEN previous incidents of missing money in the hall, Leasure said, so the residents placed a marked \$10 bill on a desk and watched for someone to take it.

A student was seen taking the bill and hiding it in a telephone directory, but he denied at first that he was involved in the theft, Leasure said.

He later admitted taking the money, but said he was going to plant it on another student who had been suspected of the previous thefts. He said he wanted the other student to be caught and punished, Leasure explained.

In the second sub-committee case, a freshman and a sophomore were placed on suspended suspension until the end of the spring term for drinking alcoholic beverages although under age and disorderly conduct.

The two students, Leasure said, had purchased beer at a local bar and thrown their empty cans at the door of another establishment. They were apprehended by State

College police and charged with violation of the minor's law and disorderly conduct.

BOTH STUDENTS had previously been on office probation for gambling in the residence hall. Their penalty supports the recommendation of the East Halls tribunal.

The dean of men's office supported the recommendation of the off-campus tribunal in disciplining two juniors who were involved in an incident of disorderly conduct at the College Co-op on Nittany Avenue.

Two girls had called the men about 3 a.m. and had invited them to the co-op, Leasure said. Neighbors complained of noise in the apartment and police investigated. The men were fined for disorderly conduct.

One of the two men, who previously had been involved in a similar incident, was placed on disciplinary probation until the end of the spring term. The other was given office probation until the end of the spring term.

Artists' Series Tickets Remain For Concert Tonight in Schwab

Only 100 student tickets and 70 non-student tickets remain for the Netherlands Chamber Choir performance sponsored by the University Artists' Series at 8:30 tonight in Schwab.

THE CHOIR, directed by Felix de Nobel, is now on its second U.S. tour. On its last tour in this country, it appeared at the University in February 1960.

On that tour, the New York Times commented that the choir "was an object lesson in the difference between recordings and live music. Missing from the disks," the review said, "are the friendliness of the men and women who sing in the choir, the atmosphere they create and the wholeheartedness of their singing."

These ten women and eight men sing out. It's not that they sing loudly but they open their mouths fully and let their voices sound forth for what they are: human voices, rather than organ pipes.

The choir was founded in 1937 by its conductor, Felix de Nobel, whose interest in European cappella music led him to form the group. Its first performances were limited to radio broadcasts but now they have made concert appearances throughout Holland and Europe.
