The University of Bridgeport is a coeducational, private, non-sectarian school. It was chartered in 1927 as The Junior College of Connecticut and expanded to a 4-year university in 1947. Last fall it enrolled 3,826 undergraduate and 470 graduate students. Its evening division, including the junior college, enrolled 2,467.

DIEM RESIGNED his post at the University on Jan. 31, 1962. Since 1958, Diem had been the overseer of the business operations of the University.

In this capacity he was in charge of physical plant planning and construction, food and housing services, personnel services and employee relations, mainte-


