Religion Editor Will Visit Chapel

Dr. Kyle Haselden, managing editor of "The Christian Century," will speak on "The Subtlest Fee" at the 10:55 a.m. Chapel Service tomorrow in Schwab.

The Chapel Choir will sing "Arise, O ye Servants of God" by Jan Pieter Sweelinck. George E. Ceiga, associate professor of music, will be the organist. He will play "Chorale Prelude on Dundee" by C. Hubert and H. Parry, "Gelobt sei Gott in hocsten Thron" by Ernest Pepping and "Toccata in A Minor" by Jan Pieter Sweelinck.

Haselden is also editor of "The Pulpit." He wrote "The Racial Problem in Christian Perspective."

The Rev. Haselden is a professor of homiletics at the divinity school at the University of Chicago. For 23 years he served as a

Baptist pastor in New York, Minneapolis and West Virginia. Haselden received a bachelor of arts degree from Furman University in Greenville, S. C., and a bachelor of divinity from Colgate Rochester Divinity School in Rochester, N.Y. Morris Harvey College in Charleston, W. Va., awarded him an honorary doctorate of divinity.

The Rev. Richard C. Martin, director of Canterbury Association, will speak on "Christian Forgiveness" at the Protestant service of worship at 9 a.m. tomorrow in the Helen Eakin Eisenhower Chapel. The Meditation Chapel Choir, under the direction of James W. Beach, will sing "O Taste and See" by Vaughan Williams.

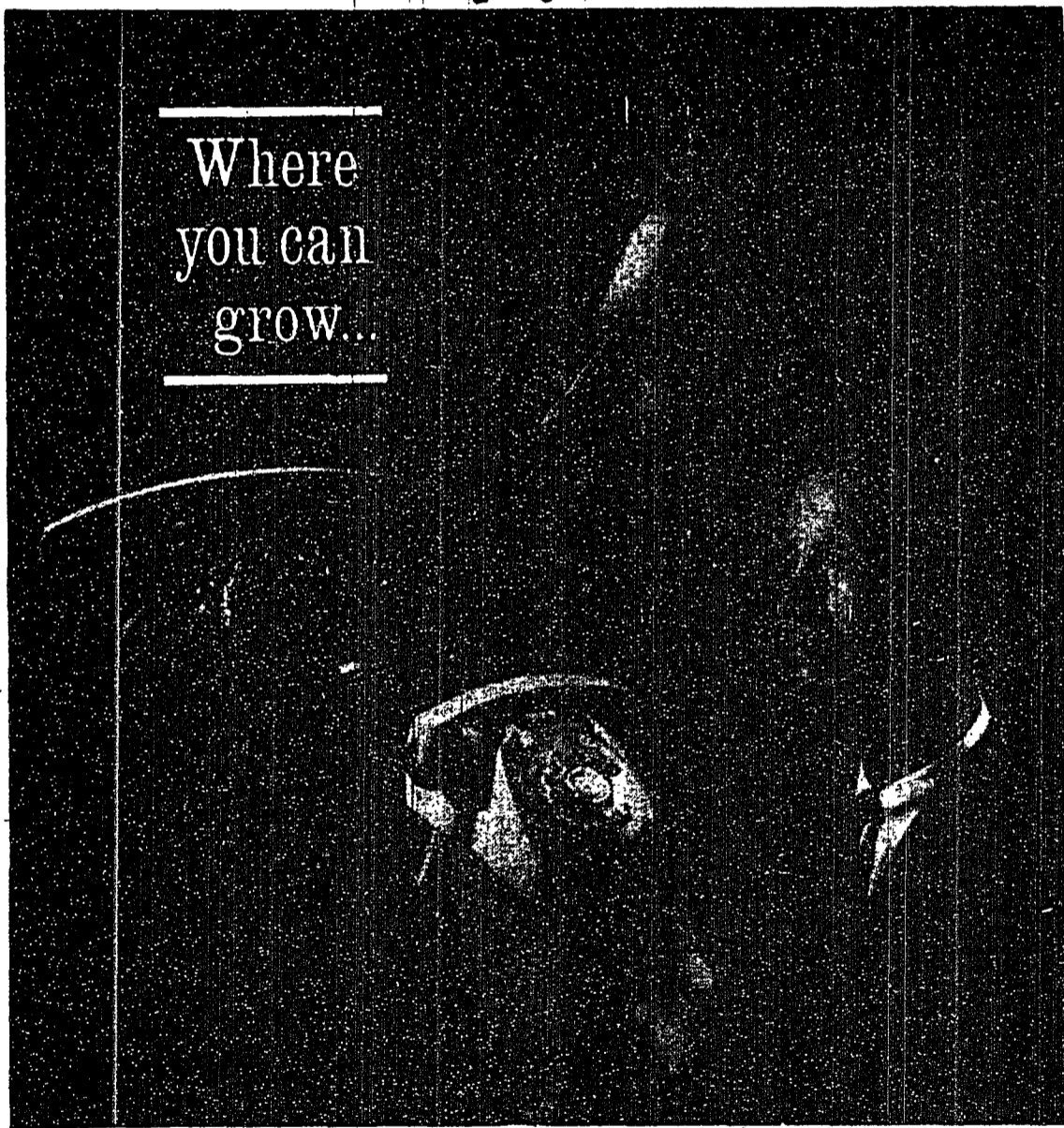
