

# Commonwealth Campus News

**UNIVERSITY PARK** — The results of a Commonwealth questionnaire, designed to evaluate the four-term system, will be sent to Robert G. Bernreuter, dean of admissions and registrar, by the first week of the spring term, according to Organization of Student Government Associations President Robert Fisher.

The questionnaire, which was discussed at the OSGA meeting, Feb. 9 and 10, has been prepared by Ogontz Student Government President Louis Huber, and has been sent to the 13 Commonwealth Campuses. Upon receipt of the completed forms, the results will be compiled and sent to Fisher.

**ERIE'S BEHREND** Campus continues to dominate the Western division of the Commonwealth Campus League with unblemished records after five rounds in all three competitions, table tennis, chess and bowling. In the South-eastern division, York leads in both chess and table tennis, with 4-0 and 3-1 records, respectively. Mont Alto is 3-0-1 in bowling. The Anthracite section has Pottsville still undefeated in chess, 5-0; Hazleton in bowling, 5-0; and Scranton in table tennis, 6-0.

A poll of the delegations at the recent OSGA meeting indicated that all campuses with the exception of DuBois are in the process of establishing chapters of the Keystone Society, freshman-sophomore honorary society. The Ankon Service Society at Ogontz has voted to become the Ankon Chapter of the society, and Hazleton's Parnassus society has also decided to become affiliated with the new University organization.

All delegations indicated their approval of the Undergraduate

Student Government's student insurance program, which will be introduced at most of the campuses with the advent of the spring term.

**ALTOONA** — A fund-raising campaign for the Altoona Campus has begun. Plans call for the construction of two new dormitory buildings and a student union building. The dormitories would accommodate 100 men and 100 women. The student union would provide recreational facilities, a cafeteria and study facilities.

The total amount of pledges required is \$650,000.

**PHILADELPHIA** — Robert Cohen, Norman Feldberg, and Joseph Tipping have been elected to the Ogontz Student Government Assembly, according to Marion Feenan, elections commission chairman.

A new constitution was recently adopted by the SGA, providing for "vast internal changes" to the organization's structure.

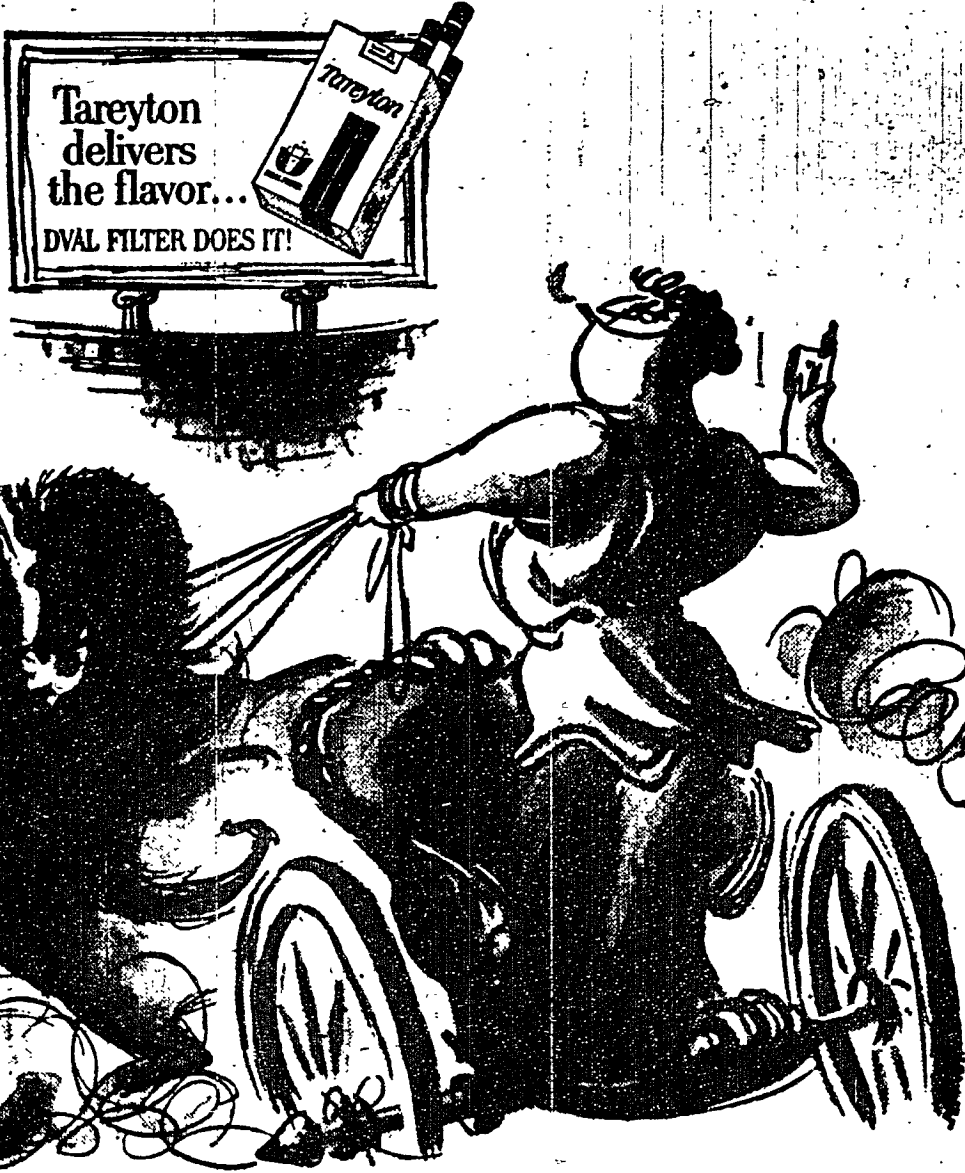

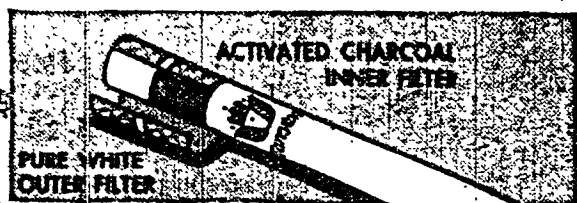
