Behrend is still unbeaten in chess, as they sport a record of 7-0; and they lead in table tennis with a slate of 5-1. In the South-eastern section, York maintains first place in chess, with a 4-0 record and table tennis, 3-1. Wyomissing tops the section in bowling with a 3-1 record.

# Government Jobs Open to Students

Students interested in working with congressmen in their Washington, D.C., offices for the summer or fall may get applications from Dr. Elton Atwater, professor of political science, in 135 Sparks.

Applications are due March 15. The work would be similar to an "internship in practical politics," Atwater said, and the students would be paid approximately \$60 per week. Most of the internships would be for eight weeks, he added.

Students offered summer internships would begin working June 11 or as soon after as possible until Aug. 8.

Several types of internships are available to students, including jobs with party state committee headquarters or jobs in the county headquarters of selected Pennsylvania counties.

# 4.0 Students Urged to Use Ability

President Eric A. Walker last night cited the fulfillment of one's potential as a debt that the University's 4.0 students will have to pay to the world.

Speaking to 168 of the 218 students who achieved a 4.0 average during the fall term at a banquet in the Hetzel Union ballroom, Walker said the students must, having demonstrated their ability, apply the effort needed to produce the leadership that the University community, state and nation will expect.

"YOU HAVE PROVEN that you can read your texts with understanding; that you can comprehend your professors and that you

can regurgitate certain material for a bluebook. Now you must do something and not just be somebody," he said.

Walker spoke after the Penn State Singers, directed by Prof. Raymond Brown, had presented a program of Elizabethan madrigals and modern Irish poems set to music.

Following Walker's address, Dr. Ernest C. Pollard, distinguished visiting professor of biophysics, spoke on the past, present and future of biophysics. Pollard said the University is undertaking a study into the production of life from non-living matter.

# Michener to Open HUB Art Showing

James Michener, author of "Hawaii" and "Tales of the South Pacific," will be guest of honor at a reception when he personally opens an exhibit of his private art collection at 8 p.m. Wednesday in the Hetzel Union gallery. He is not scheduled to speak at the reception.

The collection, entitled "James Michener — Art Collector," is part of the Land Grant Centennial Exhibition. His collection of 28 paintings will be on display from March 15 to April 5.

Michener, who won the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction in 1947 for "Tales of the South Pacific," has also written "Sayonara" and "The Bridges at Tokyo Ri." He taught at the Colorado State College of Education, and also served as visiting professor at Harvard University.

In 1957, Michener served on the advisory committee on the arts for the State Department.
