Pifer Loses to Kelvington, 3-1

(Continued from page one) ton. Pifer, last year's national runner-up at 147, scored one escape in the second period after Kelvington took a 2-0 lead with a reversal, but the Lions' only hope for a title died when Pifer failed to get off his stomach in the final period.

Kelvington accumulated 2:18 riding time for his final point.

THE TOURNEY'S outstanding wrestler, Pendleton, was one of the few grapplers to shake the upset pattern. The Engineer had little trouble controlling Army's Mike Natvig, 11-4.

Pendleton, who had pinned his first three opponents, had a takedown, three reversals, a predicament, and 8:09 riding time out of a possible nine minutes. The title was his second.

Army's Al Rushatz lost a split referee's decision in overtime to Lehigh's Angell. The Cadet, who was top-seeded, had two escapes during the 13 minutes of wrestling, and so did Angell, but the officials voted Angell the more aggressive and the victor.

THE ENGINEERS won their fifth title at 177 when defending champion Detrixhe had a reversal and time plus a penalty point. Army's Ray Nickta forfeited the

191 championship to Lehigh's Moore. The Cadet suffered a shoulder separation with 2:35 remaining in their bout. Moore, however, was leading, 4-0, with a takedown and a reversal. The top-seeded wrestler at 191,

Dennis Focht of Rutgers, lost in the semi-finals to Nickta.

The heavyweight match was no different than the rest of the bouts. Top-seeded Dale Kuhns of Army lost a 7-3 overtime decision to Scharer of Rutgers.

KUHNS SCORED a reversal with two seconds to go in regulation time to tie the score at 5-5, but the stronger Scharer was too much for the Cadet in overtime. Scharer had a takedown, two reversals plus time while Kuhns managed a reversal and an escape.

State advanced five men into the consolation finals, and three of them returned victories.

Denny Slattery, who wrestled like the Slattery of 1961, won third place at 123 with a 2-0 win over Navy's Fred Crawford; Bob Haney took third at 136 with a 7-0 verdict over Pitt's Sherm Moyer; Bill Polacek won third at 177 with a 2-0 blanking of Rutgers' Don Cary; Phil Myer took fourth when he lost to Tom Jeffries, 7-4, at 191, and Ed Pohland ended up fourth with a loss to Brown's Bill Wood, 3-2, at heavyweight.

Schmidt clouted his homer in a big five-run fourth inning off pitcher Earl Francis. But the Senators' winning tally came in the eighth when a double by Billy Klaus and errors by Dick Groat and Dick Stuart accounted for two runs.
