

Dennis to Speak at HEc Weekend Living Experiment Aids Understanding

Keynote speaker for the 13th annual Home Economics Spring Weekend to be held April 13-14 will be Lawrence E. Dennis, associate director of the Peace Corps project.

Dennis, University vice president for academic affairs before his appointment to the Peace Corps post, is responsible for the administration and coordination of all phases of selection and training.

The theme for the two-day program, announced by Grace M. Henderson, dean of the College of

Home Economics, will be "Families Around the World — Technical and Human Development."

DENNIS WILL SPEAK on "The Peace Corps — The New Frontier for Family and Community Education."

He will discuss the need for volunteers to work with families abroad and the effect which such experiences will have on Peace Corpsmen.

Dennis' address, scheduled for 7:30 p.m., April 13, in Schwab Hall will be open to the public. Several other addresses will be

given by Home Economics faculty members and other guest speakers.

IN PREVIOUS YEARS approximately 2,000 adults and high school students from Pennsylvania and other states have attended the Home Economics Spring Weekend.

Meetings will begin at 12:45 p.m. April 13 and will include talks on the development of man's shelter, food of other cultures and selection of clothing in other parts of the world.

Lectures will also be given on world food resources, the family cycle around the world, family management in southern South America and food markets in Southeast Asia.

Penn State students from Free China, Guatemala, India, Saudi Arabia, Korea, Philippines, Puerto Rico, Norway and Canada will discuss "Life in My Country."

DEAN HENDERSON will discuss how the University's home economics curriculum responds to social trends and will include facts on the need for men and women in family service here and abroad.

Tours, exhibits and films are planned for professional people, parents, students and others interested in families around the world. A special program has been scheduled for high school students.

Live with a family in another part of the world. Travel with a group of young Americans your own age. Learn how the people of another country think and live. This is the Experiment in International Living.

THE EXPERIMENT is an independent, non-profit, educational exchange organization devoted to creating mutual respect and understanding among the different peoples of the world.

Thirty-one countries—in Latin America, Western Europe, Eastern Europe, the Middle East and Asia—will be visited by members of the Experiment in International Living during the summer of 1962.

Each participant in the Experiment is assigned to a group of 10 people going to the same country. For one month, the participant lives in a foreign home as another member of the family. He spends a second month travelling informally about the country with the group and members of

the host family, then visits a major city a few days before returning home.

BEFORE THE TRIP, special orientation sessions on the language, customs, politics and other aspects of the country to be visited are given to the participant. Other sessions after the trip evaluate the summer's experiences.

Lifetime memberships will be offered for \$70 with an initial payment of \$10. One-year memberships will cost \$2. Pledges to join the Alumni Association in the future will also be accepted.

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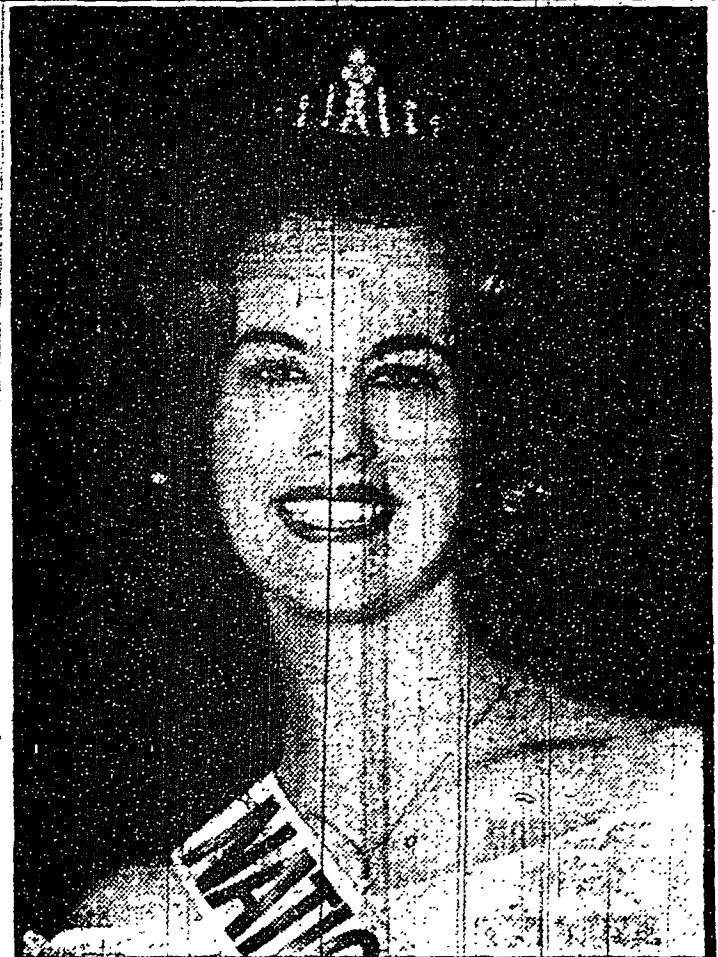
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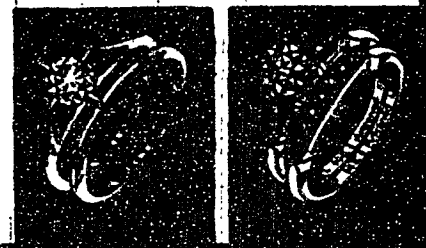
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
