Philip Defines French Crisis

The failure of political parties in France to adapt to present day problems and the ineffectiveness of the French Parliament are the two major causes of the crisis of democracy in France, Andre Philip, a French specialist in letters and public affairs, told a capacity crowd in Sparks Monday.

In his talk, sponsored by the Social Science Research Center and the Department of Political Science, Philip said the Algerian situation brought the democratic crisis to a head and afforded Gen. Charles de Gaulle the opportunity to gain control of France.

He said that he would not give de Gaulle a vote of confidence in the coming elections. De Gaulle has not successfully handled the economic and political problems within France and has done little to alleviate the problems of both economic and political disunity, he said.

There will be no hope for the French farmer, Philip said, until the current crisis in production and distribution of farm goods is solved.

De GAULLE PRACTICES both dictatorship over France and "dictatorship of the pen," Philip said. He explained that, although de Gaulle is a great writer, he will not write the truth about his handling of French political and economic affairs. He will write about the favorable aspects of his career and "what he wants to remember," Philip said. The big

problem with French political parties, he said, is not that there are too many, as most people think.

"I WOULD RATHER see no parties than not enough," he said. Although Parliament is always passing laws, he explained that few people obey them, and Parliament's power is continually declining.

The foundation of a new type of democratic government is now being envisioned, Philip said. When it becomes a reality, perhaps France can avoid the economic and political problems she has now and build a new economy.

"He WAS THE ONLY one who could solve the Algerian problem," Philip said.

In spite of de Gaulle's success with the Algerian problem, Philip
