

AWS Makes Policy Changes--

(Continued from page eight) The proposal was unanimously adopted.

The final recommendation adopted suggests adding individual community council workshops to a similar mass orientation program for all council members. The workshop is held in the fall following community council elections.

One recommendation concerning clarification of judicial regulations was defeated with the understanding that it would later be submitted to a judicial committee. The IAWS delegates had proposed that AWS consider set-

ting maximum penalties for all major rule infractions.

THE SENATE decided that this problem should be explored by the groups studying rule revisions. A committee was established last night to set up procedures for this revision. Members appointed are Miss Baer, Patricia Dyer, Ana Sol, Susan Starbird and Lynn McTavish. Miss Baer will serve as temporary chairman.

Cathy Hersey, chairman of the IAWS conference and newly-elected national president, reported to Senate that reports from steering committee chairmen are due Saturday.

Suzanne Flinchbaugh, AWS public relations chairman, announced that applications for AWS elections chairman will be available at the Hetzel Union desk on Monday.

Bicycle Inspection Set for Saturday

Inspection and registration of bicycles will take place Saturday as the initial step of the University's bicycle safety program, William C. Pelton, director of University Security, said recently.

Students whose last names begin with the letters A to L may have their bicycles inspected between 9 a.m. and noon. Those with last names beginning with letters M to Z may report from noon to 5 p.m.

The inspection will be held in Parking area 46 or, in the event of rain, at the Skating Pavilion. There is no charge for the inspection and registration.

Bikes must be equipped with a bell or horn, a reflector on the back fender, handlebar grips and secure saddle and handlebars. Wheels must be properly aligned, the peddles must have metal or rubber cleats and a headlamp is necessary if the vehicle is to be used after dark.
