Rec Hall would be available for the speech because there are no classes scheduled in the building Tuesday afternoon.

THE ONLY problem here would arise in setting up bleachers and chairs in time for the speech and taking everything down in time for the intramural program scheduled for 7 p.m. Tuesday night.

The setting up operations can be done if the physical plant is notified early Monday morning, Charles Smith, head of the maintenance and utilities division said.

He said that as long as his crew could begin work by noon, Rec

Hall could be ready in time for Johnson's speech at 4:15. **THE QUESTION** of changing the speech was not settled, however, as no one would make the final decision. Ossian MacKenzie, dean of the College of Business Administration, said yesterday that the final decision was in the hands of the students. But if asked, he said he would advise against the move because of the shortness of time.

Robert Barraclough, Career Day chairman, said that the decision was out of his hands also, and that the final decision would have to come from President Eric A. Walker.

(Continued from page one) maining at summer term registration on June 19, Koser said.

Students will be assigned to classes by term classification, beginning with twelfth term. Some schedule changes may be necessary, Koser said.

Official registration forms (No. 2 Cards) have already been received from 2,981 students for the summer term, Robert G. Bernreuter, registrar said yesterday.

These include 1,846 undergraduate students, 1,018 graduate students and 117 special students.

Last year a total of 6,636 students attended the University campus for the summer term. At least that many are expected for the 1962 summer term, Bernreuter said.

Applications for enrollment will be accepted until the time of summer registration (June 19), he said.

In addition to the University students who have applied for admission to the summer term, about 450 new freshmen will enter the University Park campus during the summer term.

Architecture Students to Present Study Results

A program very similar to the "Image of Bellefonte" presented in Bellefonte last month by fifth-year architecture students will be presented again at 3 p.m. tomorrow in Hammond to about 30 University staff members and State College residents.

The program is based on the results of a 15-week study of Bellefonte including maps, dia-

grams and models depicting the community today and recommended changes.

The 13 students who made the study will discuss their research and recommendations.

The maps and models will remain on exhibit here for two weeks and will then be returned for permanent display in Bellefonte.

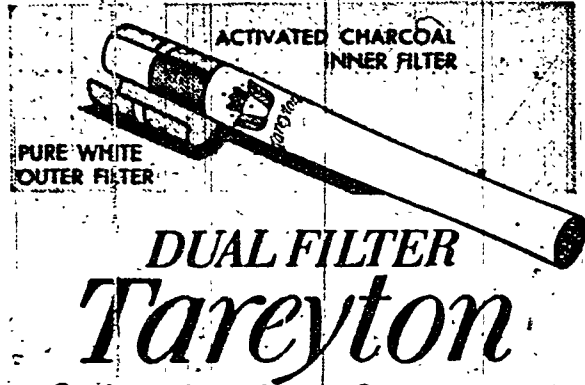
