

# Home Ec Weekend to Feature 'Around the World' Lectures

In keeping with the theme "Families Around the World - Technical and Human Development," the Home Economics Spring Weekend, April 13 and 14, will feature four lectures and a panel discussion.

Keynote speaker for the weekend will be Lawrence E. Dennis, associate director of the Peace Corps and former University administrator. His address "The Peace Corps - The New Frontier for Family and Community Education," will be given at 7:30 p.m., April 13 in Schwab and will be open to the public.

JEAN WARREN, professor of household economics and management from Cornell University, will give an illustrated talk on "Family Management in Southern South America."

Dr. Warren, who received her doctor of philosophy degree from Cornell, specializes in family financial management and the ways homemakers should use their time. She was a pioneer in the development of the homemaker's work unit.

In connection with her studies, she spent the fall of 1957 as

general adviser in the home demonstration center at San Ramon near Montevideo, Uruguay. She also worked with the director of the Institute Interamericano de Ciencias Agricolas in Uruguay.

JAMES E. MONTGOMERY, professor of family housing and home art, will give a picture story of the development of man's shelter from caves and log cabins to contemporary homes and apartment houses in his lecture, "Dwellings - from Cave to Tower."

Montgomery taught and conducted research in housing at Oklahoma State University and at Cornell University before coming here in 1959. He also conducted a research project in community planning in the Netherlands in 1956.

"Adapting Food of Other Cultures for Our Employment" will be the subject of an illustrated lecture given by Margaret B. Jennings, associate professor of foods and nutrition. Mrs. Jennings will show how everyday foods can be used in preparing exotic and distinctive dishes of other countries.

LAST YEAR, while on leave from the University, Mrs. Jennings traveled in various parts of the United States, Italy, and Spain to study cultural differences in food. Carlfred B. Broderick, associate professor of family relationships, and Joseph H. Britton, professor of child development and family relationships, will moderate panels on the "Family Life Cycle Around the World."

## Naiads to Present 'Dip With Disney'

# HRB Official Views Defense Research

Almost as soon as new defense equipment is developed by a governmental research company, it is rendered obsolete by stiff competition, Dr. John McLucas said yesterday.

McLucas, president of HRB-Singer Inc., a research corporation located near State College, spoke at the Faculty Luncheon Club on "HRB-Singer, Past, Present and Future."

DEVELOPING NEW equipment involves a long and tedious process, he said. After problems are subjected to an analytical study, solutions are suggested and developed by technicians. HRB-Singer then tests the new mechanism. If it is workable, the corporation submits the plan to the defense department for the go-ahead for production, he said.

McLucas said local teachers and professors have been of much help in solving technical problems at the local laboratory. In explaining the success of any new development of a re-

search center, he said, "Nothing worthwhile is accomplished unless there is one man who feels it is important that the research gets done, and is willing to put all his effort into it."

McLUCAS HAS recently been granted a two-year leave of absence from his position at HRB-Singer to become deputy director of Defense Research and Engineering in the Department of Defense.

He said his new position would involve the evaluation of equipment which the Army, Navy and Air Force would like to have put into production. This evaluation is necessary because defense funds are limited, he said.
