Goldsmith Wins Book Contest

Bernard Goldsmith, senior in arts and letters from Harrisburg, has won the Student Book Collection Contest, Ralph W. McComb, University librarian, announced yesterday.

THE CONTEST was sponsored by Pattee Library in conjunction with Keeler's the Pennsylvania Book Store and The Nittany News. In addition to winning the first prize of a \$50 book certificate, Goldsmith's collection will be entered in the national competition for the Army Loveman Award of \$1,000, McComb said.

Second place winner in the contest was Virginia Cohn, freshman in liberal arts from Broomall. She received a \$25 book certificate.

THE THIRD PRIZE of a \$10 book certificate was won by William Phillips, a junior in industrial psychology from Milton.

The certificates are redeemable in books of the winners' choice at the bookstores sponsoring the contest.

5 Students Disciplined

One student was suspended from the University, three others were placed on suspended suspension and another given disciplinary probation by the Senate Sub-Committee on Discipline, Daniel R. Leasure, assistant dean of men, said yesterday.

A freshman was placed on suspended suspension until the end of the fall term for shoplifting a 19-cent package of pencils from Woolworth's in State College on March 29, Leasure said. One of the clerks in the store saw the student take the article without paying for it and immediately called a nearby policeman.

A senior was suspended until the end of spring term 1963 for illegally procuring a key to the personnel record room in Wagner, Leasure said.

The student attempted to use the key March 2, but he was seen by a maid in the building and reported.

A junior was placed on suspended suspension until the end of this term for making obscene comments to another student while off campus on the night of Feb. 8, Leasure said. The student had been on disciplinary probation last year for a similar offense.

SUSPENDED suspension until the end of the fall term was also given to a sophomore for altering his date of birth on his identification card, Leasure said. The offense was discovered when the student showed his identification card to the recorder in Willard while he was drop-adding a course March 31, Leasure said.

Disciplinary probation until the end of the winter term 1963 was given to a sophomore man

for illegally entering the room of a coed the evening of April 4. The incident was reported by another coed to the senior resident, who then discovered the man in the coed's room.

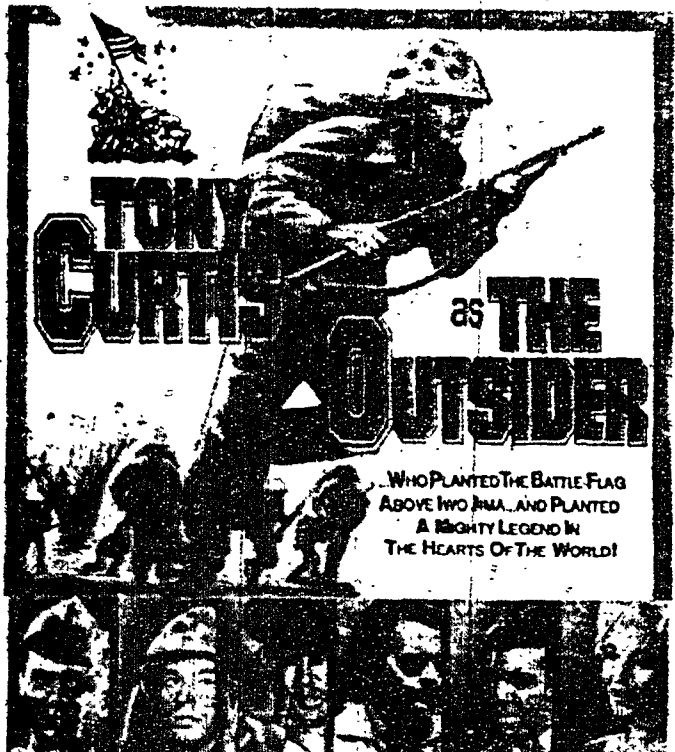
