

German Bulletin Prints Article on Study Abroad

The Bulletin, a weekly survey of German affairs issued by West Germany's press and information office, contains an article on Penn State's Study Abroad program at the University of Cologne.

The story which appeared in a recent issue, said the two universities have agreed on a student exchange which will be made a permanent arrangement if the present experiment turns out well.

THE GERMAN SPONSORS of the program have announced that this agreement is the first of its kind between an American and a German university. One of the Study Abroad Program's purposes is to counteract "the growing trend toward academic tourism" by offering solid fare in academic training, the article said.

The same issue of The Bulletin also carried a report on housing for foreign students in West Germany. German academic institutions have no dormitories, so the question of where German students, as well as those from foreign countries will live is not always easily answered, the Bulletin said.

STUDENTENWERK, a student welfare agency, embarked in 1958 on a building program to increase the number of student homes. About 27,000 students can now be accommodated. The article said, however, that rooms for 50,000 more have yet to be built if only one-third of all students are to live in student homes.

The agency feels that designs for these homes should include community rooms where cultural events can take place, as well as facilities for sports.

The Studentenwerk plan notes that these homes are the most "effective way of integrating students from abroad into the academic life of Germany."

THE PLAN recommends increasing the percentage of foreign students in all homes from the present 10 per cent to at least 20 per cent so that more foreign and German students may live together.

Any student is eligible for accommodation in the homes, the Bulletin said. Studentenwerk recommends to those interested in living in a student home that they contact the Akademisches Auslandsamt at whatever German university they are planning to attend, the article added.

Dean's List Totals 1,335; 250 Get 4.0

Official figures released yesterday by Robert M. Koser, associate registrar, show that 11 more students gained positions on the dean's list during the winter term than during the fall term.

Bachelor's degree candidates who achieved averages of 3.5 or better numbered 1,335 during the winter term as compared with 1,207 for the fall term. The number of associate degree candidates, achieving a 3.5 declined from 117 to 100, he said.

The total number of dean's list students is 1,335 for the winter term and 1,324 for the fall term.

The number of students achieving perfect 4.0 averages during the winter term was 250, Koser said. The comparable figure for the fall term was 218.

Koser said the total number of students placed on probation declined 325. The fall term figure was 2,356, he said, and the winter term figure reached only 2,031.

The number of students dropped from school following the winter term was 127, he added. In contrast, 118 students were dropped at the end of the fall term.

McCurdy Gets Leave

Joseph A. McCurdy, associate professor of agricultural engineering, has been granted a leave of absence for one year, beginning Sept. 1, 1962.

He plans to work for his master of science degree in agricultural engineering at Michigan State University.

McCurdy joined the faculty in 1950 after working for two years as a farm representative for the Pennsylvania Power and Light Company in Lancaster.

Corps Training Site Moved to California

The fifth Peace Corps contingent for the Philippines will be trained this summer at a university in California rather than at Penn State. Lawrence E. Dennis, associate director of the Peace Corps, said Saturday.

Dennis said that the shift in the training site for the volunteers this summer does not necessarily mean that volunteers will not be trained here again during the fall term.

THE FIRST FOUR contingents of volunteers for the Philippines were trained at the University under contract with the Peace Corps in Washington. The University trained 150 last summer and about 60 during the past three terms.

The purpose for changing the training site this summer, Dennis said, is that it will enable other universities to gain experience in training volunteers.

Almost all volunteers for the 25 projects now in progress have been trained both at universities in this country and in the various host countries.

THE CONTRACT between this University and the Peace Corps, which expires in June, is the only continuous contract in the nation. Other universities contracts have been for only one group of volun-

teers for a particular country. The Philippine government has requested over 1,300 Peace Corps volunteers. The fourth group is still on campus and will complete its training here at the end of this term.

THE UNIVERSITY chose not to renew its contract to continue training volunteers this summer, Dr. Paul W. Bixby, director of the training program, said yesterday.

Presently, 25 per cent of all volunteers overseas or in training are for the Philippine project. This percentage is expected to drop since training for many new projects is scheduled to begin this summer, Bixby said.
