

Baseballers Blast Army Navy Tops With Home Run Attack Trackmen In Opener

Apparently the Penn State baseball team learned a valuable lesson in its 14-5 loss to Ithaca last week.

Ithaca scored five runs in the first inning of that game and the Lions never recovered. The Nittanians exploded for a five-run first inning of their own Saturday to defeat Army, 8-4.

Beating Army at West Point is an accomplishment in itself, but the way the Lions managed the victory was practically pleasing to State mentor Joe Bedenk.

The Nittanians had three home runs in the victory to boost their record to 3-1. One of those blows was the key hit in the Lions' big first frame.

"WE PLAYED a pretty good game considering that we hadn't had any practice since the Ithaca game," Bedenk said yesterday. "Those three home runs were all well hit. It's good to see those big boys start to hit."

The big boys are first baseman Pete Liske, leftfielder Dick Anderson and rightfielder Roger Kochman.

It was Liske's long drive in the first inning that helped State get off to a flying start.

Army starter Jefferson Davis got into hot water almost immediately. The Cadet righthander walked two of the first four men he faced, the Lions scoring their first run on an overthrow of second after a passed ball.

A looping single by Anderson and another error gave the Nittanians their second run. Catcher Don Jonas made it 3-0 with another single and Army coach Eric Tipton yanked Davis.

LISKE GREETED reliever Tom Eccleston with a blast over the left field fence — good for two more runs to boost the score to 5-0.

That was all the margin that State starter Bob Fenton needed to post his second win against no defeats.

Lefthander Fenton yielded seven hits and all the Army runs before giving way to Marlin Biesecker in the ninth.

"Fenton wasn't sharp," Bedenk said, "but he pitched a good game."

Penn State's track and field team recorded only three first-place finishes and failed to place a man in one event — the javelin — in its sound 89½ - 41½ defeat by Navy in the first meet of the season at Annapolis, Saturday.

The Freshman thinclads fell to an even worse fate, losing 95-36.

THE WEATHER was cold and windy, making coach Chick Werner's thinclads feel right at home.

Unfortunately, Navy wasn't a very hospitable host.

Howie Deardorf and Gerry Norman were the only bright spots for the Lions, dividing 16 points between them. Deardorf finished first and Norman second in the mile run, and then the two switched places in the two-mile.

Jerry Wettstone captured the only other first place, a 6'4" leap in the high jump. Navy's Terry Boyd finished three inches below Wettstone for second and State's George Casey and Earl Pace tied for third at 6'.

Lion Bob Grantham and Navy's Tom Dumont ran two close races in the hurdles events. Grantham was clocked in 34.7 seconds in the 120 high hurdles, the same time as Dumont, but the Middle was awarded first place by the judges. In the 220 low hurdles, Dumont again beat Grantham to the tape, this time by a tenth of a second. Grantham also took a third place in the broad jump with a 22'2" leap.

Captain Steve Moorhead, switched from the mile to the 440 and 880-yard runs, finished third in both events.

STEVE POPP placed second in the 100-yard dash in 9.9 seconds, and third in the 220 with a 22.2 clocking.

In the field events Ciro Risoldi and Ron Beard finished in a three-way tie for second place in the pole vault.

John Courtney placed second in the discus throw with a heave of 144'5½" and Tom Urbanik finished third in the shot put behind Navy strongmen Mike Berkowitz and Greg Mather.

Colin Grant and Larry Allen led the Lion frosh with first places in the mile and 880.

Anderson and Kochman accounted for the Nittanians' final two tallies with long home runs in the top of the eighth.

Fenton tired late in the game, giving up two runs in the eighth and one in the ninth before Biesecker came on to retire the side.

The Lions return to action against Penn on Murphy Field in Philadelphia tomorrow. Bedenk plans to start Biesecker against the Quakers.

Lion Linksmen Trip Colgate for 2nd Win

Penn State's golf team downed Colgate, 5-2, on the University golf course Saturday, giving the Lions a perfect record of two wins against no losses.

Despite the cold and windy weather, the Lion linksmen had little trouble garnering the win over Colgate. State led at the end of the front nine holes by a 5-2 score and retained its margin over the back nine.

LION CAPTAIN Bob Swahn turned in the best score of the day when he beat Stu Benedict, 7 and 6. This score means that at the end of the twelfth hole, Swahn had won seven holes in the match play competition, making it impossible for the Lion senior to lose. Swahn shot a five over par 74.

Sophomores Jim Tabor, Roland Gartner, and Joe Baidy displayed good form for the Lions when they ousted their opponents by scores of 4 and 2, 4 and 3, and 3 and 2, respectively.

Rich Gilison accounted for the

other State tally by beating John Anderson, 3 and 2. Meanwhile, Bill Robinson, who won on the back nine against Georgetown last week to give the Lions their initial victory, was defeated by Jim Harberson, 1-up. Teammate Paul Hummer was beaten by Al York, 2 and 1.

"Considering the strong windy condition, soft, mucky turf, and cold temperatures which prevailed," Lion coach Joe Boyle said, "the performances that both teams turned in were outstanding."

Boyle also drew praise for Tabor and Gartner. Both golfers turned in three over par 72's. He also singled out Swahn for his good showing.

The Lions face a week layoff until Saturday when they play host to Penn.
