

Fall Preregistration Dates Announced 1500 Forms Mailed For Term Survey

Preregistration schedules for the fall term were announced yesterday by Robert M. Koser, associate registrar. The University deadline for registration is June 20.

Students in the College of Agriculture should see their advisers by appointment between May 7 and May 12. Completed number 2 cards are to be turned in at the registrar's office, 4 Willard.

Business administration students will see their advisers May 3, 4 and 5. When completed, number 2 cards will be handed in at the college office in Boucke.

CHEMISTRY AND PHYSICS students should make appointments to see their advisers during the period May 1 through May 15. Number 2 cards are to be taken to the registrar's office.

Freshman in the College of Education should make appointments with their advisers now. Upperclassmen in secondary education have until May 5 to see their advisers.

Rehabilitation education students should report to 418 McAllister to see their advisers according to the following term classification schedule: 4th, 5th and 6th term students, April 30; 7th, 8th and 9th term students, May 2 and 10th, 11th and 12th term students, May 7. Appointments will be between 7 and 9 p.m. in all cases.

ART EDUCATION majors should report, by appointment, to 135 Temporary on May 1, 2 and 3 to sign up for specific hours on the bulletin board opposite 120 Temporary.

Industrial education or industrial arts students should see their advisers between April 23 and May 4. Individual appointments are required.

Music education students should sign the appointment list in the Armory before April 20. Psychology and elementary education students are to see their advisers before May 19.

Completed number 2 cards for all education students are to be returned to the registrar's office.

ENGINEERING and architecture students should see their advisers for an appointment before June 20, and return the completed number 2 cards to them.

Home economics students should make arrangements to see their advisers before May 20. The adviser will collect completed number 2 cards.

Liberal arts students should see their advisers by June 20. Number 2 cards are to be turned in at 138 Sparks.

MINERAL INDUSTRIES students should see their advisers before May 15. Completed number 2 cards are to be taken to the office of the students' major department.

Physical Education students should see their advisers between May 8 and May 18. Advisers will collect completed number 2 cards.

Approximately 1,500 questionnaires and explanatory letters were mailed to students Monday requesting them to answer questions evaluating and comparing the four-term plan with the semester system.

The questionnaires, which were drafted and revised by the Inter-College Council Board and the individual college councils last term, are being distributed to about 10 per cent of the student body.

The mailing list for the survey was compiled by the Office of Student Affairs Research, and represents a cross-sampling of the student body.

RESULTS OF THE evaluation will be tabulated and published in The Daily Collegian later this spring.

In the explanatory letter, Warren Long, chairman of the ICCB four-term evaluation committee, asked students to return the completed questionnaire by mail or take it to the Hetzel Union desk before Monday.

The survey is designed to determine student opinion on critical points of the four-term system, Long said.

THE QUESTIONNAIRE includes specific questions concerning length of classes, retention of subject material, suggested vacation periods and proposals for a separate examination period, Long added.

Long stressed the need for student cooperation in order for the survey to be a success. "We hope to get as close to a 100 per cent return as possible," he said.

Long also said he hopes students will discuss the questions with their friends before completing the form. "We want the opinions of as many students as possible," he added.

THE LETTER accompanying the questionnaire explained that many comments on the pros and cons of the term system have been heard, but this survey is the first one designed primarily to determine students' opinions.

Below Normal Temperatures Should Continue

Temperatures should continue to average about ten degrees below April normals for the next several days.

The very gradual warming trend that began yesterday should continue today, but somewhat cooler readings are expected tomorrow.

Today should be mostly cloudy and cool with a few brief showers. The high will be near 52 degrees.

Mostly cloudy skies and chilly weather is indicated for tonight and tomorrow. A few light showers or snow flurries are likely.

Today's low should be near 39 degrees, and a high of 48 is forecast for tomorrow.

Peace Corps Test Set for Saturday

Peace Corps Placement Tests will be given at 8:30 a.m. Saturday at the State College-Post Office.

Volunteers for projects in Asia, Africa and Latin America will be selected from those taking Saturday's tests. Tests will be given at this time throughout the country.

The volunteers selected will be trained this summer at the college centers in the United States.

Any American citizen 18 years of age, or older, may take one of the two types of placement tests which will be given. Married couples without children may also apply.

In order to take the test given for teaching positions, a person must have a bachelor's degree, although he need not be a qualified teacher. The other test is for people interested in fields other than teaching.

\$10,000 Grant Will Expand Library Research Collections

A check for \$10,000 was presented to the University last Friday as the first grant under the Library Code, approved by the 1961 Legislature to provide a statewide system of library services.

Under the Code, the University library will receive state aid to acquire major research collections.

These collections will be made available to other libraries of the Commonwealth.

The presentation was made by Ralph Blasingame, Jr., state librarian, to President Eric A. Walker. Also present were Senator Jo Hays, D-Centre, chairman of the Senate Education Committee, which approved the legislation, and Ralph W. McComb, University librarian.

The library at the University, Blasingame said, is one of four in the Commonwealth that will serve as regional resource libraries. The others are the State Library in Harrisburg, the Carnegie Library in Pittsburgh and the Free Library in Philadelphia.

Commenting on the program, Walker said, "The University is pleased to have its library designated as a regional library resource center and through participation in the plan will be able to serve the Commonwealth more adequately."

The formal presentation, held in the office of President Walker, was arranged as a part of the observance of National Library Week.
