

Baseballers Win Fourth, 7-6

Lion Nine Tops Penn On 4 Hits

 PHILADELPHIA, April 18 — The University of Pennsylvania's baseball team played the perfect host today, giving visiting Penn State a baseball game, 7-6.

The two teams took turns trying to hand each other the win on chilly Murphy Field. State (4-1) finally accepted the victory from the hapless Quakers (2-4). It was the second straight win and the fourth loss in a row for Penn.

Lefthander Bob Fenton was the benefactor of the Quakers' sloppy play, boosting his record to 3-0 with a two-hit performance in relief of State starter Marlin Biesecker.

THE LIONS collected only four hits off the combined offerings of loser Glen Tobias (1-1) and Marvin Goldklang, but five Penn errors and five key walks helped pave the way to the win. The Quakers wasted eight hits and four Lion errors.

The game was scoreless until the last half of the fourth inning when the Lions started the generosity by giving the Quakers a run.

Penn catcher Bob Zajac led off the frame with a single, but Biesecker retired the next two men. Mike Tate then hit a liner to left for another single, Zajac coming around to score as Lion left-fielder Roger Kochman bobbled the ball.

The Quakers returned the favor three-fold in the State half of the fifth.

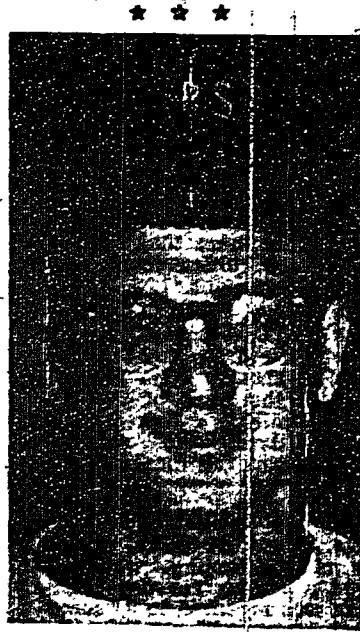
DON JONAS walked to start the State rally, took second on a sacrifice and third on a wild pitch. Kochman then hit a sacrifice fly to short right field, scoring Jonas.

Biesecker reached on an error, centerfielder Dick Pae walked and Don Robinson doubled for the Nittanies' first hit in the inning. Third sacker Fred Light followed with a two-run single before Tobias put out the fire.

Penn tied the score with three

runs in the bottom of the fifth. Dave McKinley led off with a double, Bob English followed with a single and Bob Murray drove both runners home with a triple.

Lion coach Joe Bedenk quickly summoned Fenton from the bullpen and the little lefty got out of the inning after Zajac sacrificed Murray home with the Quakers' third run of the frame.

The Nittanies scored two runs in the sixth and the eventual winning run in the seventh before Penn could score again.

Rightfielder Dick Anderson reached first on an error as the first man up in the sixth. A single by first sacker Pete Liske and a walk to Kochman loaded the bases with one out.

Quaker third baseman Al Lerner then committed an error to allow one run and Tobias walked second baseman Don Robinson to force across another tally. Result: two runs on one hit.

THE NITTANIES scored their final run without the benefit of a hit. Shortstop Johnny Phillips walked to start the inning and Penn coach Jack McCloskey brought in Goldklang.

Liske walked to load the sacks again. Kochman drove Phillips across with the Lions' seventh run on a fielder's choice.

Penn closed out the scoring with two unearned runs off Fenton in the seventh.

McKinley singled, Murray walked and Phillips bobbled a two-out grounder by Zajac to load the bases. Rightfielder Bob Purdy drove both runs across with a double.

The Lions return to action against Bucknell on Beaver Field Tuesday.

Pappas Beats Yanks With Arm and Bat

BALTIMORE (AP) — Milt Pappas pitched the first six innings of a 1-0 victory over the New York Yankees last night and hit the game-winning homer for the Baltimore Orioles.

Pappas, who underwent an emergency appendectomy in Florida March 12, was removed from the game when his arm stiffened in his first starting assignment.

A one-inning relief stint last Sunday was his only other appearance since the operation.

The 23-year-old right-hander gave up two singles and a walk through the first six innings in a brilliant duel with New York's Bill Stafford.

Banks also tripled across the first Cub run in the first inning as the Colts, who had beaten the Cubs three straight in Houston, made their first Wrigley Field appearance.

MILWAUKEE (AP) — The Milwaukee Braves launched their 1962 home campaign by defeating the San Francisco Giants 6-4 yesterday on a four-run eighth inning touched off by a walk and a safe pop bunt.

Ageless Warren Spahn earned his first victory after two defeats, employing a puzzling curve, half-ed the Washington Senators on after starting the decisive rally. Don Nottebart and Bob Hendley shared the mound in the ninth to preserve Spahn's 310th National League triumph.

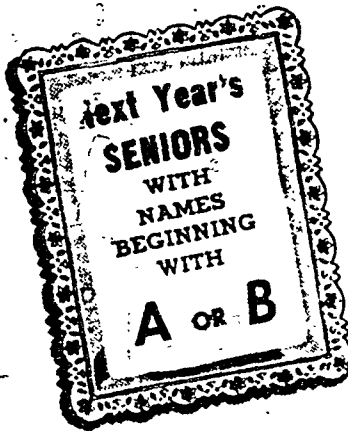
Pirates Win 7th; Defeat Phils, 4-3

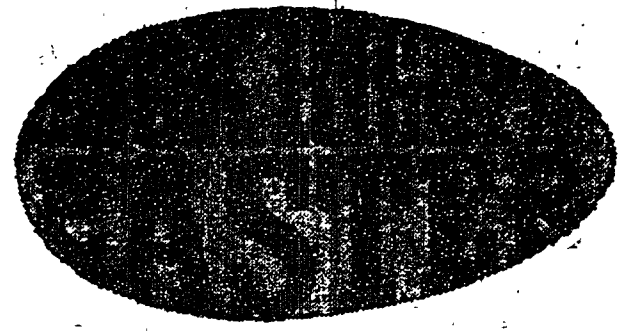
