**THE BUREAU** could be used to find out how the students felt about details of the proposed grading system, Baker said. He stressed, however, that the information gathered would be compiled and used only as a guide and the USG Congress would have the final say.

To make up for incoming freshmen's lack of enthusiasm for the University, Wharton said their plank to make a movie about outstanding alumni would show new students the quality of their predecessors here at the University.

He said he is not satisfied with the job being done by the freshman customs board in this regard.
