

ICCB Career Exposition Fraternity Caterers Plan Organization To Include 26 Companies

The Inter-College Council Board will sponsor its third Career Exposition next Tuesday and Wednesday with 26 industries participating in the program, Robert Harrison, ICCB publicity chairman, said last night.

"EACH COMPANY will have a separate display booth on either the ground or first floor of the Hetzel Union Building," Harrison said. They will also send representatives to answer students' questions concerning job opportunities the companies have to offer, he added.

"All students are invited to visit the different display booths from 9 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Tuesday, and from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Wednesday," Harrison said.

The entire program has been geared to acquaint both seniors and undergraduates with job opportunities available after graduation as well as part-time and summer employment.

"Approximately 70 companies were invited to participate in the program and we received acceptances from 26 corporations which should be adequate to answer questions from students enrolled in all ten colleges, he explained.

DURING THE spring term each college council submitted a list with the names of companies they felt would benefit students in each curriculum within their college, Harrison said.

Ervin Hill, ICCB chairman said last night, "Undergraduates in all colleges are urged to visit the booths and speak with representatives to help them determine what courses they should schedule to better prepare them for their career choice.

The ICCB originated the career day program in the spring of 1959 with approximately 40 companies participating. Display booths were omitted from the first program.

LAST YEAR 26 companies sent representatives and display booths to orient and counsel students planning careers in a special field.

A committee of five fraternity caterers met last night to organize an association of fraternity caterers, Howard Berkowitz, caterer of Beta Sigma Rho, said last night.

THE COMMITTEE met following a recommendation presented at the caterers' meeting during the Interfraternity Council's workshops held last Tuesday.

Their recommendations will be brought before a meeting of all the fraternity caterers on May 7.

Associations of four to six caterers from the fraternities would be formed in order to purchase food in mass quantities, Berkowitz said.

The formation of a two day training program for caterers in

the fall term was also discussed, he said. This training program would include guest speakers from the Food Service Department of the College of Home Economics, who would teach the caterers how to prepare menus and food. They would also discuss the newest methods of sanitation, he added.

A booklet containing the names of the different food distributors, waiters and cooks in State College would also be published by the association, Berkowitz said.

The booklet would also include the newest methods of sanitation, nutrition and a month's menu, Berkowitz said. In addition, a list of equipment, owned by the different fraternities such as silverware, crystal and dinnerware,

would be published in the book. This list would enable the fraternities to know where they might borrow equipment, he added. All broken equipment would have to be replaced, he said.

The caterers would meet once every three weeks to hear guest speakers from the Food Service Department on different aspects of menus, nutrition and sanitation, Berkowitz said.

"WE HOPE that the caterers association will be set up as a regular IFC activity," Benjamin Zuckerman, chairman of the caterers' workshop, said.

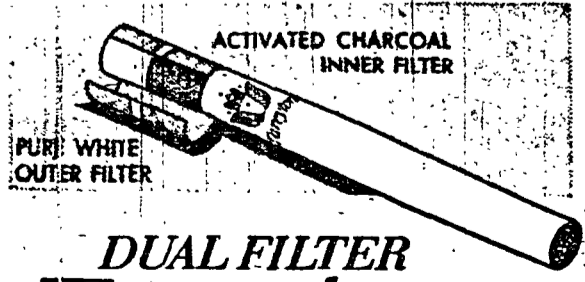
"In this way, we can bring our ideas before the IFC meetings and have all the fraternities agree on them," Zuckerman said.
