Pledge Presidents Reject Jr. Panhel

The idea of establishing a junior Panhellenic Council for sorority pledges was viewed with disapproval by a majority of the pledge classes, sorority pledge presidents reported last night.

At the meeting the pledge presidents suggested that instead of a junior Panhel, a workshop for pledges be held to discuss problems geared to their interests.

It was suggested that such a workshop could be incorporated into the annual Panhel workshop and be attended by one or more pledge class representatives.

A majority of the pledge presidents, however, favored the establishment of a separate, more intensive workshop for pledges, at which discussions would be guided by sorority members or Panhel delegates.

The pledge presidents said their pledge classes disapproved of establishing a junior Panhel because they felt it would be a body without any real purpose or power.

Band, Orchestra, Chorus Program To Begin 5-Week Session July 2

High school students, college students and the "older set" will have an opportunity to mingle musically again this summer when the Band, Orchestra, and Chorus School opens July 2, Hummel W. Fishburn, head of the Department of Music, said recently.

Now in its eighth year, the school constitutes a training ground for student musicians and a laboratory for supervisors of music desiring to improve their teaching techniques, Fishburn said. The school provides class and individual instruction in vocal music and on the various instruments of the band and orchestra, he added.

The five-week program will also include work in music theory, ensembles, which will provide students with an opportunity to perform in recitals, modern orchestra and private study.

Students from colleges throughout the state will participate in the fourteenth annual Pennsylvania Intercollegiate Interpretive Reading Festival at the University tomorrow and Friday.

THE FESTIVAL, sponsored by the Department of Speech, the University Readers and oral interpretive classes, will hold sessions in the Hetzel Union Building.

Representatives from the Behrend, DuBois, Hazleton, McKeesport and Ogontz commonwealth campuses; East Stroudsburg, Indiana, Kutztown, Shippensburg, Juniata, Saint Francis, and Wilson colleges will take part in the festival.

A poetry session at 2 p.m. Thursday will open the two-day program. The annual banquet will be held in the HUB dining rooms at 6 p.m. Thursday featuring the University Readers. An evening reading program will also be held at 8 p.m. in the HUB assembly room.

The sessions on Friday will feature readings in the drama and short story. The morning session

will begin at 9:30 a.m. and the afternoon program at 1:15 p.m.

The members of the faculty who will participate in the program include D. Reifsnider, associate professor of theatre arts, and Robert E. Galbraith, professor of English. Reifsnider will speak at the Friday session on "Following the Playwright's Blueprint." Galbraith will speak Friday afternoon on "The Modern Writer's Art."

Among the University students who will participate are Josephine Barger, junior in arts and letters from Curllsville, in poetry; Nancy Huber, junior in bacteriology from St. Thomas, and Michele Ohrman, junior in arts and letters from McKeesport, in short story.


LESLIE GRANAT, freshman in liberal arts from Freeport, N.Y., Rochelle Goulde, sophomore in secondary education from Falls Church, Va., and Miss Ohmar will participate in the drama reading.

Miss Ohmar, president of the Readers will extend greetings to all participants in the opening session.
