

# Annual Livestock Show Scheduled for Saturday

The 45th annual Little International Livestock Show sponsored by the Block and Bridle Club will be held Saturday at the skating rink.

The event will include showing of the American quarter horse stallion, Poco Shade, winner of the Michigan novice cutting championship and the register of merit in reining and pleasure horse classes. Poco Shade was recently given to the University by Wencloch Farms, Ann Arbor, Mich.

Little International will open at 8 a.m. with competition by breeds of beef cattle, swine and sheep. Afternoon competition will select champion fitters and showmen in each breed and in the selection of over-all champions among breeds. The show will climax with the selection of the grand champion showman.

The beef cattle division will include 16 offspring of Keystone Bardoliermer, third ranking sire in 1960 and second ranking sire in 1961.

The swine division will exhibit the first place Yorkshire pen as shown at the Pennsylvania Livestock Exposition.

The sheep division will feature Southdowns, Hampshires, Cheviots, Shropshires and polled and horned Dorsets.

Features at the show will include a sheep dog demonstration, a sheep shearing demonstration and meat raffle.

Queens for the show are Dorothy Allbeck, Miss Penn State Agriculture; Sarah Jones of Buckingham, Miss Pennsylvania Wool Queen; and Jane Clarke of Centre Hall, 4-H Queen of Centre County.

A special dedication award will be made to Milton E. Miller, director of the field staff of the American Angus Association. Miller graduated from the University in 1932.

Manager of the show is Fred Thomas, senior in animal husbandry from Beavertown. Assistant manager of the show is Donald Kinnan, junior in animal husbandry from Miami, Fla.

Cattle superintendent is Thomas Williams, junior in animal husbandry from Colmar, Ill.

Swine superintendent is Lenn Harrison, junior in animal husbandry from Johnstown.

Sheep superintendent is Thomas Coons, senior in animal husbandry from York.

# Grinberg to Chair ICCB for 1962-63

Edwin Grinberg, president of the Business Administration Student Council, was elected chairman of the Inter-College Council Board for 1962-1963 Tuesday.

Alan Bober, president of the Engineering-Architecture Student Council, was named vice chairman of the ICCB, and Virginia Finn, president of the Home Economics Student Council, was elected secretary-treasurer for the fall term only.

"I HOPE in the future ICCB can co-ordinate career days similar to that of the College of Business Administration and the yearly ICCB Career Exposition by bringing prominent companies and outstanding leaders in different professions to the campus," Grinberg said.

Ervin Hill, past chairman of

the board, announced that Merle E. Campbell, dean of student affairs of the Commonwealth campuses, is the new advisor of the ICCB.

In other business, the board adopted a revised constitution and approved the annual budget.

ICCB for 1962-1963 academic year will be made up of the new presidents of the student councils or incumbent presidents who will still be in office in the fall.

THE OTHER new council presidents who will be sitting on ICCB will be Yetta Ginsburg, education; David Muns, division of counseling; Morris Baker, liberal arts; John Fox, mineral industries; Richard Jeffries, chemistry; Thomas Paton, physical education and Al Cartwright, agriculture.

# Library to Hire Research Personnel

The \$10,000 check recently presented to the University as the first grant under the library code will be used primarily to hire personnel to plan for acquiring major research collections, Ralph W. McComb, University librarian said yesterday.

The person in charge will study library facilities and negotiate the

purchasing of collections, McComb explained. Forthcoming grants from the state will then be used to purchase these collections.

Under the library code Pattee Library is designated as a regional library resources center and will make these collections available to other public libraries throughout the Commonwealth.
